effect, and the Swede has cause enough to suspect the worst, since they have sorbidden them all Trade with Plescom, or

any other of the States.

Vienna, Dec. 10. In Upper Hungary there are some untoward divisions raised, betwixt the Protestants and the Papills, about their right to some Churches; and they are grown to that height, that they will hardly be composed without calling a General Dyet, which as the Emperours Assairs now stand, cannot be of advantage to him. Count Balassi Imbre is charged with very high mildemeanours, but refuses to make answer to them at Vienna; instifting, that by the Laws and Priviledges of his Country, he is not accountable for what they accuse him of, to any but the Hungarian Diet, and that there only he will appear to make his desence.

The French Relident here, (no:withstanding the Agreement that was made before) resules new to accept of the 2200000 Florins, and that assignation of the Polish Salmines, for the two Dukedoms of Ratibor and Oppelen, which strange kind of deportment, makes us suspect they would

not be forry to find any occasion to quarrel with us.

Legern, Dec. 18. On the 16 instant here arrived seven English Marine.s; who belong to the Advise, and Little S. George, having made their escape from a French ship that ran ashoar on the Island of Cersica in her return home from the French Fleet, to which the carried Provisions from Toulon. They report the Advise laden with Currants from Zantataken' about two months fince by two French Men of War, and a Fi e-ship of Tunis; and that the Little St. George was taken going from Sicilia to Malaga, laden with Corn. The French, they lay, gave out, they had Orders to carry all English ships into Toulen, whither they were then to return. The English Mariners were dispos'd into several ships of the French Fleet. The Sun, an English ship, coming in 43 days from Constantinople, reports, that forty Galleyes, and eight ships were upon their departure for Canea with Soldiers and Provisions. This week two Proclamations were published here, the one forbidding Commerce with England, the other with Culten and Frank fort, because of the fickness.

Deventer, fan. 2. The Bishops Forces are still abroad, and make havock of the Countreys, whilst ours ly still in Garrison. A Party of 7000 Horse under the command of Grave Hoembergh, and General Forgatz, have been at Wenterzwick, where they have incouraged their men with our spoiles; they past by Almelo, and are now marching higher up into the Countrey. A Party of their Horse fac'd Doesburgh, where they took away a Prisoner from under their Walls, and found none so hardy to give them opposition, though they are 22 Companies in the Garrison, and fix of them French. Wedde holds our still obstinate, and answers our shot with their Cannon, which makes the Beliegers weary of their imployment. One falley they made, in hopes to fetch in a number of Cattel, but they mist their design and went off with loss. That which troubles us most, is, the fear of some ill Friends among our felves, for the people are observed to be very busie in meeting, and in such numbers, that Broesema, the Commander of Coeverden has sent to Groningen for more Forces, as not knowing the meaning of such Assemblies, but there are among them that say, 5000 of the Bishops Forces are coming out of Munster-land to them, and it so, it is easy to understand the business. About 1000 are drawn out of this Place, and some out of Swol, and other Garrisons, to go 35 is said, toward Almelo, which the Bishop's Forces have taken possession of

Hague, Fan. 3. The States General of Holland and West-Friesland, met by particular Order again on Friday last, where they choose one Burgh of Amsterdam in the place which Myn Heer Meirman refused. The Companies of Sterrenburgh and Van Bont, upon their march to these parts, met with Orders that remanded them to Zurphen: The truth is, the Bishops Fotces are more busic and powerful, then we understood them; and therefore no wonder, if upon better Information, there is an alteration in the former Resolutions. To morrow the Lords Commissioners of the Councel of Holland, will dispose of the Lieutenauts and Ensigns places in the Regiment of 3000 that is newly raised. The Treaty

with Denmark lies as it did, fill uncompleated, and the People have been to often gilled with flories of its being perfected, that they can hardly be any longer perfected to expect a

good iffice of it.

Bremen, Dec. 30. This City begins to be allaim'd at the Swedes march, and are new putting themselves in a posture of defence. The Connors are drawn on the walls, and the Inhabitants disposed to maintain their Right against all opposition; to which purpose we are raising tome. Forces for fix Moneths, and are not without hope of affishance from our Neighbors. However, we have sent two Deputies to Count Wrangel, the Swedes General, who yet remains at Straetfonds, to expostulate the matter with Lim, and to know if he

have any intent against this place.

Poole, Dec. 30. The 28th instant corre into this Road a French Sloope, who chased a small Vellel of this Town, but being to wind-ward she got safe to Harber. Thomson, Commander of a Privateer belonging to Margate, came hither yesterday with a Prize of about 170 Tuns, her Cargo valued at 8000 pounds sterling, having aboard her 100 Tuns of Malago Sack, 300 Barrels of Fruit, and a quantity of Silkes. In her voyage homeward fle put into Guernfey, to wash and tallow, where she met with Captain fones, a Cammander of a Privateer, that was lately call away upon the Coast of France, but himself and Company all saved. At their landing in France they were fecured, and kept close Priloners for five weeks, their allowance but 18 deniers a day. Commandet fones says, that civers Letters of Reprisal are granted against the English to these of New-Leven, where they were P. Moners, and that he saw some of their Commissions; three of them were ready to fet fail, one of 12, andther of 24, and a third of 30 Guns.

Dartmouth, Dec. 29. A Veilel of Topfhan come in hither from the Barkadoes, in company with 14 more, making her Voyage in about 9 weeks. One of them about three days after they were out at Sea, was by an unhappy accident burnt, another not long after lunk, but all the men taxed. About 150 Leaguer off these ships parted company, and this slip, with 4 more, about a hundred Leagues off, met a Durch Man of War of 30 pieces of Ordnance, who taking one of them, mann'd her, and with these two made fight against the other three, who had about 12 pieces eath ship. This Vesel being of no force, made her escape, and lest them energed. The

issue is not yet known.

Portsmouth, Dec. 31. Yesterday Captain Bell in the Tyger, brought in two Prizes, and the Trinity a third. One of them is avowedly a Holland Vessel laden with Oranges and Lemmons.

Southwold, Dec. 28. Yesterday past by fifty sail of laden Colliers, twenty of them great Ships, who report they saw no

Holland Men of War in their whole peffage.

Plymouth, Dec. 29. Yesterday in the Evening, the Sorlings brought in a Prize of 250 Tuns, laden with Carants. By her Papers, the Goods wholly (if not the Ship) belong unto Amsterdam. The Nightingale hath sent in another Prize laden with Bees, 456.

Dover, Dec. 29. Yesterday the Holland Ambassador, Van Goth, set sail this Morning from hence in the Little Mary

Frigot, with a fair wind for Flushing.

Deal, Dec. 30. Yesterday about Evening, 17 Prisoners from Newgate, who were about a Earbadoes ship, got off their Fetters, secur'd the ships Crew, and went askere about a mile to the Northward of Deal: the Master of the ship made pursuit after them, and this day took sour in this Town. One of our Neighbours, exchang'd from Flusting, came home Yesterday, who reports the Dutch to be sixing out their ships; and that sour Capers are going out from thence, each carrying thirty Guns.

Harwich, Dec. 30. On Thursday several Colliers from-Newcasite anchored in Oasly Bay, within sight of us. Yesterday, and this day, most of them set sail toward the South. They talk of some Ships cast away off of Blackney, but with-

out any certainty.
