Dublin Cattle, May 29, 1798.

OFFICIAL REPORT from Major General Sir Jamés Duff, dated Monastereven, May 29, 1798.

I Marched from Limerick on Sunday Morning with Sixty Dragoons, the Dublin Militia, their Field Pieces, with Two Curricle-Guns, to open the Communication with Dublin, which I judged of the utmost Importance to Government. By Means of Cars for the Infantry I reached this Place in Fortyeight Hours. I am now, at Seven o'Clock this Morning, (Monday) marching to furround the Town of Kildare, the Head-Quarters of the Rebels, with Seven Pieces of Artillery, One Hundred and Forty Dragoons, and Three Hundred and Fifty Infantry. I have left the whole Country behind me perfectly quiet and well protected by Means of the Troops and Yeomanry Corps. I hope to be able to forward this to you by the Mail Coach, which I will effort to Naas. I am fufficiently firong.—You may depend on my Prudence and Succefs. My Guns are well manned, and the Troops in high Spirits. The Cruelties that have been committed on fome of the Officers and Men have exafperated them to a great Degree. Of my future Operations I will endeavour to inform you.

P. S. We found the Rebels retiring from the Town, on our Arrival, armed. We followed them with the Dragoons. I fent on fome of the Yeomen to tell them, on laying down their Arms, they fhould fhould not be hurt. Unfortunately fome of them fired on the Troops. From that Moment they were attacked on all Sides. Nothing could ftop the the Rage of the Troops. I believe from Two to Three Hundred of the Rebels were killed. We have Three Men killed, and feveral wounded. I am too much fatigued to enlarge.

SEVERAL Capital Burgefles of the Borough of Malmefbury, in the County of Wilts, on Behalf of themfelves and others, Capital Burgefles of the faid Borough, having this Day prefented their Petition to the Houfe of Commons, fetting forth, that a Select Committee of this Houfe, appointed to try and determine the Merits of a certain Petition, prefented by James John Vaffar, Efq; complaining of an undue Election and Return for the faid Borough of Malmefbury, did, on the 10th Day of

May, 1797, report to the House, that it having ap peared to the faid Committee, that the Merits of the faid Petition did wholly depend upon the Right of Election in the faid Borough; the Counfel for the feveral Parties had been required by the faid Committee, to deliver to the Clerk of the faid Committee, Statements in Writing, of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended ; and fuch Statements having been accordingly delivered in, as well on the Part of the Petitioner, as of the Sitting Member; that the faid Committee had determined, that the Right of Election, as fet forth in the Statement delivered in, on the Par: of the Sitting Member, is the Right of Election for the faid Borough; "Right of Election of Burgefiles, to fay,----" That the "Right of Election of Burgefiles, to ferve in Parlia----" ment for the Borough of Malmefbury, in the "County of Wilts, is in the Aldermen and Twelve Capital Burgeffes of the faid Borough only."-And that a Petition has lately been prefented to the Houfe, by certain Perfons stilling themselves Burgeffes of the faid Borough of Malmefbury, flating that they had been advifed, that the Right of Election, fo determined by the faid Committee, and reported as aforefaid, on the 10th Day of May, 1797, is not the Right of Election for the faid Borough; and praying that they may be admitted as Parties to oppole the Right of Election fo determined and reported as aforefaid ; and that the Petitioners, on the contrary, being advised, that the faid Right of Election, fo determined and reported, is the true Right of Election for the faid Borough, and that the fame ought to be established, pray to be admitted by the Houfe as Parties to defend the fame, in cafe it shall be deemed expedient to refer the faid Petition to a Select Committee : But that the Petitioners are advifed further to flate to the Houfe, that it also ap-pears by the Journals of the Houfe, that on the 7th Day of November, 1796, a former Special Committee of the House, appointed to try and determine the Merits of several Petitions of John Vassar, Elg; and alfo of certain Perfons stilling themselves the Affistant Burgesses, Burgesses, Landholders, and other the Burgeffes of the Borough of Malmef-bury, in the County of Wilts, complaining of an undue Election and Return for the faid Borough, reported to the House, that it having appeared to the faid Committee, that the Merits of the faid Petitions did in Part depend on the Right of Election, and the faid Committee having thereupon required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the

Clerk of the faid Committe, Statements, in Writing, of the Right of Election, for which they refpectively contended, and fuch Statements having been delivered in accordingly, as well on the Part of the Petitioners as of the Sitting Members, the faid Committee had determined, that the Right; as fet forth in the Statement delivered in on the Part of the Sitting Members, is the Right of Election for the faid Borough of Malmefbury, and appears in the fame Report to be as follows; (that is to fay) " That the Right of Election of Burgefles " to ferve in Parliament for the Borough of Mal-" mefbury, in the County of Wilts, is in the Al-" dermen, and Twelve Capital Burgefles only;" and that from the Date of the faid laft-mentioned Report, fo made to the Houfe on the 7th Day of November, 1796, until after the Expiration of Twelve Calendar Months, no Petition appears to have been prefented by any Perfon or Perfons whatfoever to the Houfe, praying to be admitted as Par-

tieg
