AT the Court at St. James's, the 22d of August, 1798,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHERÈAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this in-

stant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Thomas Cobb, of Newgate-Street, in the City of London, Grocer, His Royal Licence and Authority, that his infant Son Jewer Henry Cobb and his Issue, may take and use the Surname of Jewer only, pursuant to the last Will of Thomas Jewer, late of the City of Bath, Esquire, deceased; provided such His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none Effect.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Honorable Edward Hawke, Esq; eldest Son of the Right Honorable Martin Haden Lord Hawke, His Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue by Frances Anne Harvey, his Wife, second Daughter of Stanhope Harvey, late of Wormersley, in the County of York, Esquire, deceased, may assume and add the Surname of Harvey immediately after their Christian Name or Names, and before the Name of Hawke, and also bear the Arms of Harvey quarterly with his present Family Arms of Hawke, pursuant to the last Will and Testament of the aforesaid Stanhope Harvey, Esquire, deceased; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in his College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none Effect.
