Whit hall, April 19. The 16th Inflant about 12 at night, a Letter without a Name was ibruft into the Key bole of the Lodgirg where Edmund Warcup E/g; a Juflice of the Peace, lycs, containing a Suggestion that two of the Life-Guard-men in the Kings own Troop might be jujtly suspected to be two of those that Affaulted John Arnold Esq; the day before, in a Bar-barous manur. Mr. Warcup, next Morning by six, found out the frid Life Guard men, and brought them to Mr. Arnold, who upon bearing their Examinations, declared be remembred fo well the Voices and Faces of the Perlons who had affaulted him, that beknew these Gentlemen truly Innocent, and therefore did entirely acquit them of all suppicion in this matter. They were likewife shewed to a Milliner near Mr. Arnolds Lodging, who had objerved two or three Perjons to skulk suspiciously near that place on that Thursday, and the Milliner upon strift view declared they were none of those suspicious perfons. However Mr. Warcup took their Examination in Writing, under their bands, where and with whom they had spent that Thursday and Friday til Nine in the Morning, and delivered the fame to Mr. Scudamore and Mr. Price, 100 Fuffices of Monmouthshire, and Mr Arnold's particular Friends, that they might trace out the truth of the faid Examination, where and with whom the Life-Guard-men had spent the faid time; And yesterday those Gentlemen declared before His Majefly at the Committee of Forreign Intelligence, That they found all things agreeable to the Examinations of the fail Life-Guard-men in suchy particular, and that there was not the least suspicion that they or either of them were in the least manner concerned in the faid intended Affaffination upon Mr. Arnold. And it farther appeared that they had, among the reft of the Guards, taken the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, received the Sacrament, and Subscribed the Test, according to the late Att of Parliament.

Whitchall, April 22. The Lieutenant of the Tower baving this morning given an account to the Right Ho-nourable the Earl of Sunderland, His Maje-fties principal Secretary of State, That he had secured a certain luspicious person, who had a burt in his Lég, which one of the Officers of the Tower found him dressing in the Lord Powis his Ledgings, the said Per-on was this Afterneon brought hither, and Examined at the Committee of Examinations, where be owned his Name to be Joseph Cruytsvelt, That he arrived at Harwich, from Holland, in the Packet-Boat. on Monday was Sevennight, from whence he came to London the Wednesday following, and lay at the Saracens-head near Aldgate that night, That the next day being Thursday be went to the Lady Powis's bouse in Lincolns-Inn-Fields, and stayed there that day and night; That the day following be went to the Tower, to the Lord Powis's Lodging where he flayed till be was taken : That he was recommended to the faid Lord Powis to be lis Servant, by two Dutch Merchants, and that be received the burt on his Leg by a fall from a Horse; And one of the Kirg's Chirurgions being sent for, and fearching his Legs in the prefence of the Lords of the Committee, he certified, That there appeared no fgn of a wound or peircing of the skin by any weapon,

but only a Bruise. Ilcowever their Lordships thought fit to Urder the Clerk of the Council in Waiting to go with the faid Joieph Critytivelt, being in the Cultody of a Messen, to Mr. Arnold, who having seen him; declared, That one of the three perfons who affullted him was a little man, much about this perfons Size, but that he could not Charge him, and that the Perfon who be supposes was wounded in the Leg, was a tall man. The Lords of the Committee not be rg fatisfied with the account the faid Cruysvelt bad given of himself, Ordered he should be kept in safe Custody to b farther enquiry could be made concerning him.

One Richard Kavennach, a Foot-soidier, bavis 1kwise been taken upon suspicion that be was one of the th ee Perfons concerned in the faid Barbarous Attempt upon Mr. Arnold, was Examined by their Lordships, who directed be should be carried to Mr. Arnold, to fee whether he knew him, and afterwards kept in Safe Cullo-dy in order to his farther Examination; And that in the meantime one of the Clerks of the Council and Mr. Warcup should go to the feveral places where he pretended he had been that day and night when Mr. Arnold was fet upon, to enquire and to give their Lordships an account whether they found what he had said to be true.
