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Dublin Castle, 6th October, 1798.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Bryan Connor, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency gave the Royal Assent to

An Act to enable the Commissioners of the Treasury in Ireland to receive from the Commissioners of the Treasury in England the Sum therein mentioned as a Loan, in Part of the Supply granted to His Majesty, and for securing the Interest and Charges thereon, and on a Sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds British Currency therein mentioned.

An Act for continuing and amending an Act, passed last Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act for regulating the issuing of Licenses for the Sale of Wine, Ale, Beer, Cider, and Spirituous Liquors by Retail, and for preventing the immoderate Use of Spirituous Liquors," and for granting to His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, the Duties therein mentioned.

An Act for the Sale of His Majesty's Quit-Rents, Crown and other Rents, and of the Lands forfeited in the Years One Thousand Six Hundred and Forty-one, and One Thousand Six Hundred and Eighty-eight, and other Lands yet remaining undisposed of, in such Manner and under such Provisions as are therein mentioned.

An Act for the better Collection of Sums arising from forfeited Recognizances, and from Fines imposed at Assizes, Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, and Sessions of the Peace, and for the future Application of the same.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant an Annuity for the Life of his Serene Highness the Prince of Meeklenburgh Strelitz, Nephew to the Queen.

An Act for settling and securing a certain Annuity on John Earl Saint Vincent, and the Two next Persons to whom the Title of Earl Saint Vincent shall descend, in Consideration of the eminent Service performed by the said John Earl Saint Vincent to His Majesty and the Public.

An Act for settling and securing a certain Annuity on Adam Viscount Duncan, and the Two next Persons to whom the Title of Viscount Duncan shall descend, in Consideration of the eminent Service performed by the said Adam Viscount Duncan to His Majesty and the Public.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant an Annuity of One Thousand Six Hundred Pounds per Annum to Robert Boyd for his Services as a Judge.

An Act for the better Regulation and Examination of the Public Accounts.

An Act to amend the Laws for promoting the Linen and Hempen Manufactures.

An Act for directing the Application of the Sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Pounds granted

by Parliament to the Dublin Society for the Improvement of Husbandry and other useful Arts.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to inquire into the Losses of such of His Majesty's loyal Subjects as have been Sufferers in their Property during the subsisting Rebellion in this Kingdom.

An Act for authorizing the Payment of the Sums therein mentioned, granted for defraying the Expence of re-printing the Journals of the House of Commons, and making Indexes thereto.

An Act to further explain and amend the Laws now in Force relating to the Militia in this Kingdom.

An Act to authorize the issuing and Payment of the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds granted as a further Supply for the Foundling Hospital and Work-House in the City of Dublin.

An Act to authorize the issuing of Treasury Bills to the Amount therein mentioned to the Company of the Grand Canal to carry on the Navigation to the River Shannon, and to authorize the issuing of Debentures to the Amount therein mentioned, to enable the Company of the Royal Canal to proceed in carrying on the said Canal.

An Act to enable the Chief Governor of this Kingdom to appoint One of His Majesty's Counsel learned in the Law to be Chairman of the Session of the Peace in the County of Dublin during good Behaviour.

An Act for the further Amendment of the Acts relating to the Post Office, and for the further facilitating Prosecutions under the said Acts.

An Act for preventing the Desertion of Seamen from Ships trading between this Kingdom and His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in the West Indies.

An Act for the better Regulation of the Royal Canal Company.

An Act to enable the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Dublin, and other Persons therein named, to grant certain Grounds in the City of Dublin to the Society of King's Inns, Dublin.

An Act to remove Doubts respecting the Property in the Service of Persons transported from this Kingdom.

An Act for quieting Corporations.

An Act for the more effectually preventing the forging of the Notes and Bills of the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland, and the Circulation of forged Notes and Bills of the said Governor and Company.

An Act for the Attainder of Edward Fitzgerald, commonly called Lord Edward Fitzgerald, Cornelius Grogan, and Beauchamp Bagenal Harvey, deceased, of High Treason.

An Act to prevent Persons from returning to His Majesty's Dominions who have been or shall be transported, banished, or exiled on Account of the present Rebellion, and to prohibit them from passing into any Country at War with His Majesty.

An Act to compel certain Persons who have been engaged in the late Rebellion, which hath broken out in this Kingdom, to surrender themselves and abide their Trials respectively within a limited Time, on Pain of being attainted of High Treason.

An Act for indemnifying such Persons as have acted since the First Day of November One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-seven, for the

Preservation of the Public Peace and Suppression the Insurrections prevailing in some Parts of this Kingdom.

An Act for the King's most gracious, general, and free Pardon.

An Act for the Relief of Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves according to Law.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His Majesty, intitled, "An Act more effectually to suppress Insurrections, and prevent the Disturbance of the Public Peace."

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, intitled, "An Act to make conspiring to Murder Felony without Benefit of Clergy."

An Act for better enforcing the Execution of the Acts made for the Trial of controverted Elections of Members to serve in Parliament, by disqualifying certain Persons who have endeavoured to obstruct the due Execution thereof from voting at any Election hereafter.

An Act to explain and reduce into One Act the several Laws for making, improving, and repairing the Turnpike-Road leading from the City of Dublin to Kiltullen Bridge in the County of Kildare, and to the Twenty-one Mile Stone Westward of the said Bridge, and for prolonging the Duration of the Act for repairing the Road from Naas to Limerick, and for the further Improvement of the Road from Kilworth Mountain to the City of Cork.

And to One Private Bill.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech :

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Have the Satisfaction of acquainting you that I have received the King's Commands to release you from your long and fatiguing Attendance in Parliament; and I am ordered to thank you, in His Majesty's Name, for the unshaken Firmness and Magnanimity with which you have met the most trying Difficulties, and with which the Measures have been planned which you have adopted for the Preservation of your Country.

I offer you my most sincere Congratulations on the glorious Victory which has been obtained by His Majesty's Squadron under the Command of Sir Horatio Nelson over the French Fleet in the Mediterranean, which not only reflects the highest Honor on the Officers and Seamen by whom it has been achieved, but affords a Prospect of the most beneficial Consequences to the future Interests of the British Empire.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I am commanded to convey to you His Majesty's particular Thanks for the Supplies which you have so liberally granted, and by which you have manifested both the Extent of the Resources which this Kingdom possesses, and the Spirit with which they are employed by the Commons of Ireland for the Preservation of the State.

His Majesty laments the Necessity which calls for the Imposition of fresh Burdens on His Majesty's Subjects, but he trusts that they will see how much their present Safety and their future Happiness depend on their Exertions in the arduous Contest in which they are engaged; and he assures his faithful Commons that the Aids which they have afforded

shall be carefully applied to the great Object of maintaining the Honor and promoting the Interests of their Country.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Circumstances which have taken place since its Commencement, must render this Session ever Memorable.

The foulest and darkest Conspiracy was formed and long carried on by the implacable Enemy of these Realms for the total Extinction of the Constitution, and for the Separation of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland from Great Britain. By the unremitting Vigilance of my Predecessor in this Government the Treason has been detected; the Apprehension of the principal Conspirators, and the salutary Measures wisely adopted, checked its Progress; and through your sagacious Diligence it has been developed in all its Parts, and traced to all its Sources.

A dangerous and wicked Rebellion, the Consequence of that Conspiracy, has been in a great Measure subdued, and the Attempt of our inveterate Enemy to rekindle the Flame of Civil Discord, by sending a Force into this Country, has terminated in Defeat.

Religion, that greatest Comfort and Support of Mankind, has been most wickedly perverted to the Purpose of inflaming the worst of Passions, and the vilest Arts have been used to persuade the ignorant and unwary, that in a Reign which has been marked by a Series of Indulgences to all Sects of Christians, it is the Intention of His Majesty's Government to oppress, and even to extirpate that Description of His Majesty's Subjects who have received repeated and recent Marks of His Favor and Protection.

The Catholics of Ireland cannot but have observed what has been the Conduct of those who affect to be their Friends, towards the Rites and the Characters which they venerate, and under whose Auspices the persecuted Pastors of their Church have found an Asylum.

Amongst a Number of Offenders some most active Characters have necessarily been selected as Objects of Public Justice; but in every Period of this dangerous Conspiracy the Lenity of Government and of Parliament has been conspicuous, and a general Act of Pardon has recently issued from the Royal Mercy for the Purpose of affording Security to the Repentant, and encouraging the Deluded to return to their Duty.

The Vigour and the Power of His Majesty's Arms, the Loyalty, Spirit, and Activity of His Regular, Militia, and Yeomanry Forces, together with the prompt and cordial Assistance of the Militia and Fencibles of Great Britain, have abundantly proved how vain every Attempt must be, either by Treachery within or by Force from Abroad, to undermine or to overturn our Civil and Religious Establishments.

From the Dangers which have surrounded you, and which you have overcome, you must be sensible that your Security can only be preserved by persevering Vigilance and increasing Energy. You will not suffer your Efforts to relax, and you may be assured of my zealous Endeavours to second your Exertions. Our Hopes and our Objects are the same, that the Deluded may see their Error,

and the Disaffected be reclaimed; but if an Endeavour shall be made to abuse the Royal Mercy, and to form fresh Conspiracies in the Prospect of Impunity, offended Justice will then be compelled to extend to the obdurate Criminal the full Measure of his Punishment.

Amidst your Measures, either of Power, of Justice, or of Clemency, you have not forgotten to afford Consolation and Encouragement to the Loyal. The Means which were adopted for their temporary Relief, and the Plan which has been devised for the further Remuneration of their Losses, are highly honorable to your Feelings, and must, in every Loyal Breast, excite Emotions of Love and Gratitude to his Country.

Since my Arrival in this Kingdom I have received the most flattering Assurances of your Regard and Approbation, which command my warmest Acknowledgments; and whilst I feel myself thus encouraged and supported, and reflect on the Loyalty which is so generally displayed, and on the Force which is entrusted to my Direction, I cannot allow myself to doubt of the Success of our united Endeavours for the Welfare of this Country.

After which the Lord Chancellor, by His Excellency's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brads, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.



Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him; or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions; and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Bras, or other Metal; or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools; he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to

be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively; wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving, or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
