and that, by a general and vigorous Co-operation, the Enemy may be speedily compelled to accept fuch Terms as shall restore to those Countries now suffering under his Usurpation and Tyranny, a Reestablishment of their former Governments, and enfure to this and the other Countries of Europe an honorable and permanent Peace.

While we amply participate in the Joy universally diffused over your Majesty's Dominions by the Continuance of that Series of Victories which has carried the Naval Glory of Great Britain to a Degree of Splendor hitherto unknown, and afforded so great Security to these Realms against the daring Efforts of unprincipled Enemies, we feel ourselves deeply impressed with Gratitude to that Over-ruling Providence, which has rendered your Majesty's Arms so eminently triumphant, and distinguished your People by those peculiar Bleffings which they enjoy under your Majeity's mild and paternal Reign.

That it may ever please the Supreme Ruler of the World to continue to your Majesty's Arms that Course of Victory from which so much Glory has redounded to the British Name; and that the Enemy, at last humbled by repeated Defeats, may foon be brought to adopt those Sentiments and Terms of Peace which are compatible with the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, with the Security of your Dominions, and with the Happiness of your People; are the fervent Wishes and Prayers of,
