WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, High Steward, Recorder, Aldermen, and Citizens of your ancient City of Chichester, in Common-Council assembled, happy in this Occasion of approaching the Throne, beg Leave to express our sincere and fervent Congratulations on the many and great Successes which, under the Divine Providence, have been, during the present War, achieved by the gallant Officers and Seamen of your Majesty's Fleets; and particularly on the late glorious and decisive Victories obtained by Rear-Admiral Lord Nelson of the Nile, and Sir John Borlase Warren; by which the Machinations of your Majesty's arrogant Foes have been in some Sort defeated, their Navy in the Mediterranean Sea almost annihilated,

and the Commerce of this Nation secured and extended.

We beg Leave to express our warmest Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, and to our happy Constitution; a Constitution which every Day's Experience teaches us to appreciate more highly, and which we pledge ourselves to defend to the utmost of our Abilities.
