Animated with the most zealous Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Family, we rejoice in the Prospect of the Advantages and happy Confequences that will accrue to this Kingdom from fuch fignal Succefs; and we look forward with the moft pleafing Expectations to the Moment when we shall have to triumph in the greatest of all Bleffings, a firm, fafe, and honorable Peace.

At the fame Time that we rejoice in the Succefs of your Majefty's Naval Forces, we beg Leave to offer our Congratulations on the Deftruction of those Plans which have been employed for the Subverfion of all Order in a Neighbouring Kingdom, and on the fpeedy Profpect of the Refforation of Peace and Tranquillity.

From the firmest Principles of Loyalty and Re-gard, we trust your Majetty will be assured of our hearty Endeavours to promote every Measure conducive to the Honor of the Crown, and the Wel-fare, Prosperity, and Interests of these Kingdoms.

The Confequences of this glorious Defeat, though at a Diftance from our native Shores, is highly important to the Interests of your Majesty's Realms; and when coupled with the still more recent Destruction of this daring Foe, who threatened a Defcent upon our Coalts, we may confider our Naval Successes as complete, beyond all historic Example.

We devoutly pray that, through Divine Pro-vidence, your Majefty's Arms may at all Times be enabled, by fuch gallant Exploits, to counteract

the Machinations of our Enemies, and by these Means accelerate the Return of an honorable and permanent Peace.
