Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the States of the Island of Jersey, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with Assurances of the heartfelt Joy with which we view every Circumstance which can contribute to your Majesty's personal Satisfaction, the Honor of your Arms, and, what constitutes the chief Object of your paternal Government, the Safety and Prosperity of your Dominions.

Impressed with these Sentiments, and happy in the frequent Recurrence of Events calculated to call them forth, we have marked, with the profoundest Gratitude to the All-wise Governor of the World, the various Occasions on which His seasonable Interposition, the Prudence and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils, and the Skill and Bravery of your Commanders and Forces, have in this arduous Con-

test frustrated the Designs of an ambitious and lawless Enemy.

But amidst the many Naval Exploits which will immortalize the Reign of your Majesty, we more particularly crave Permission to express how cordially this small but ever loyal Part of your Kingdoms participates in the general Exultation diffused throughout the Empire by the glorious Victory of Rear-Admiral Lord Nelson of the Nile; a Victory in its Nature completely decisive, in its Consequences incalculably important.

Your Majesty's faithful Subjects have another recent Cause of rejoicing in the total Discomfiture of the Foe in his late Attempt to invade Ireland, and to stir up the dying Embers of a most unnatural Rebellion fomented by his insidious Practices; and we beg that your Majesty will condescend to accept, with your usual Benignity, our warmest Congratulations on Successes reflecting high Lustre on your Flag, productive of Security to your Dominions, and of Advantage to the general Interests of Europe.

That your Majesty may long live in the Enjoyment of the Favors of Providence, and in the pleasing Employment of conferring Happiness on a grateful People, is a Prayer which the States of your Majesty's Island of Jersey prefer with no less Ardor than Sincerity.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects beg leave to approach your Royal Person with our most sincere Congratulations on the Victories lately obtained over the Power of France by your Majesty's Fleets.

The Consequences necessarily flowing from these decisive Victories, will, we trust, be so important, that while the almost unexampled Valour and Skill displayed on these Occasions by your Majesty's Forces are most gratefully admired, we not only look forward to the immediate Safety of the British Empire from the Attacks of an implacable Foe, with which it has been threatened and assailed, but likewise to the Continuance of that System of religious Belief and well-ordered Government so long established in Europe.—Animated by the successful Stand which your Majesty has made in Defence of the Independance and Rights of your Crown, we hope that other Powers will exert a similar Spirit and Perseverance.

It will be our earnest and fervent Prayer to Almighty God to prosper your Majesty's Arms, to
