WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common-Council assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne with our sincere and warm Congratulations upon the signal and brilliant Victories obtained by your Majesty's Fleets under the Command of the gallant Lord Nelson and Sir John Borlase Warren.

When we consider the important and splendid Advantages acquired by your Majesty's Arms, and the invincible and unexampled Spirit and Gallantry which have so eminently distinguished your Majesty's Officers and Seamen, we feel, with a lively and sincere Gratitude, the Protection of an Almighty Power, in the complete Humiliation and Defeat of an impious and ferocious Enemy.

We beg Leave further to add, that your Majesty's faithful and loyal Citizens of Dublin are determined to exert with Ardour every Effort for the Preservation and Protection of their excellent and unrivalled Constitution; a Constitution which they hope to transmit down to their Posterity, as their best and noblest Inheritance.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, the 19th Day of October, in the Thirty-eighth Year of your Majesty's Reign.
