Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that an anonymous threatening Letter was received on Sunday the 3d Instant, by Oliver Cromwell, Esq; of Cheshunt-Park, in the County of Hertford, threatening Death to him, to Sir George William Prescott, Bart. and to all those Persons who should concur in the proposed Bill for inclosing sundry Lands and Commons in the Parish of Cheshunt; of which Letter the following is a Copy, viz.
