TIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honorable Sir George Yonge, Baronet, Knight of the Bath, to be Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, in South Africa, with its Territories and Dependencies; he this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's Plantations.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, Fringed or Plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-rings, Black or White Shoes, Fans, and Tippets.

Undress, White or Grey Lustrings, Tabbies, or Damaiks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Full-frimmed, Fringed, or Plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles. Undress, Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thurf-

day the 11th Instant, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, Colored Ribbons, Fans, and Tippets; or Plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or Plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats Full-trimmed, Colored Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday the 14th Inftant the Court to go out of Mourning.

Whitehall, January 26, 1799. The King has been pleased to give and grant unto Isaac Donnithorne, of the Parish of St. Agnes, in the County of Cornwall, Esquire, and to Elizabeth Harris, of Hayne, in the County of Devon, Spinster, second Daughter and Coheir of Christopher Harris, late of Hayne aforesaid, Esquire, deceased, His Royal Licence and Authority, that immediately after the Solemnization of their in-tended Marriage, the faid Isaac Donnithorne may take and use the Surname of Harris, in addition to that of Donnithorne, and also bear the Arms of Harris, of Hayne, Quarterly with his own paternal Arms; and that the faid Elizabeth Harris may continue to use and bear the Surname of Harris only, notwithstanding such Marriage; and that the faid Surname and Arms of Harris may be used and borne by her Issue respectively; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office:

And also to order that His Majesty's faid Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
