

wards Swisserland, and he himself, with the Remainder of his Army, towards Fribourg and Offenbourg, by the Black Forest.

Whilst this was passing in Suabia, General Masfena in Person attacked, on the 23d, the Position of Feldkirk, where General Jellachich commanded in the Absence of General Hotzè. The French were repulsed with very great Loss, and driven over the Rhine. General Hotzè is since returned to Feldkirk from Buckhorn, with the Corps of Twelve Thousand Men, which he had marched to that Place, the French having retreated from thence in consequence of the Archduke's Victory of the 21st.

The Loss on both Sides in these different Actions, which appear to have been hard fought, has been very considerable, but much greater on the Part of the French than on that of the Austrians, who have, however, lost several Officers of Distinction. On the 21st, the French are stated to have lost Four Thousand Men—on the 23d, Three Thousand—and on the 25th, their Loss is stated to have been much more considerable than on either of the preceding Days.

On the 26th, the Archduke marched in pursuit of the Enemy.
