Most Gracious Sovereign,

A T the Moment of conveying to our Country a Pledge of our Affection, We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, impressed with the most respectful and cordial Sentiments of Loyalty, and Attachment to your Royal Person, which no Distance can impair, no Absence diminish, beg Permission to approach your Majesty as the august Head of that Constitution which binds our Hearts and Interests, by indissoluble Ties, to our Native Country.

Looking to that invaluable Conflitution for the best Protection of individual Security, civil Liberty, and rational Freedom, we cannot but feel an earnest Interest in the Exertions which have been made to deseat the Attempts of our inveterate Enemies; against such Enemies, and the ruinous Principles they propagate, we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we are ready with our Lives and Fortunes to support your Majesty's Crown and the Constitution of our Country; and we implore Divine Providence to continue that Instuence over your Majesty's Person, Councils, and Arms, which has hitherto enabled your Majesty to contend with Success against the Essors of our Enemies, to the End that your Majesty may obtain for your People a safe, lasting, and honorable Peace.
