Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurnalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act "to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Export-"ation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation
of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain "the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, " or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."-And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this inflant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His-Majesty's Service, that the faid Pro-And complibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to comcarry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, carried; or goveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vita, without Leave the Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurting the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the

Ningdom, or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder or Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitules Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Exe"cution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of "His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His "Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying "Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for " making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirmed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vita, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitae to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernfey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newsgundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Ma-jesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manuer as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commis-fioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commis-fioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively apper-W.
