by the Combined Imperial Armies, the various Kingdoms and States of Italy have been refeued from the predatory Fyranny of French Power.

Among the fortunate Effects of those Exertions, it is a Subject of much Joy to us to observe the Restoration of the Throne of Naples to its lawful Possession, and the Renewal of our former friendly Intercourse with that Kingdom.

We have derived the most fincere Satisfaction from the fignal Check which the French Expedition to Egypt has fustained from the Exertions of Turkith Arms, animated by the gallant Co-operation of a finall Detachment of His Majesty's Forces under the Direction of a Commander, whole Skill and Heroism entitle him to our warmest Applause and Admiration.

It is a Source of just Pride and Exultation to us that the hoftile Projects of the common Enemy in India, have terminated in the entire Deftruction of the Power which their Artifices had deluded into the Support of their ambitious Schemes; and that the timely, vigorous, and decifive Councils of the Marquis Wellefley, aided by the tried Abilities and Intrepidity of His Majefly's Generals, Officers, and 'Froops, have both beneficially enlarged the Britifh Poffeffions in that Quarter of the Globe, and placed them in a State of folid and permanent Security.

We are truly fenfible to the important Advantage which has accrued from the Defcent of His Majefty's Forces and his Ruffian Allies on the Coatt of Holland, by the Refcue of the Dutch Fleet from the Power of the Enemy; and although the Seafon proved fo peculiarly unfavourable for Military Operations, as to render it impracticable to perifit in an Enterprize fo fortunately commenced, and thus prevented the entire Accomplifhment of His Majefty's Views, yet the Refult of the Expedition has been productive of the moft beneficial Effects to this Kingdom, by removing all Fear of an Attack on our Coafts from a Quarter whence it had been fo often planned, and by enabling His Majefty's Fleets to direct their undivided Attention to the only Port from which the Enemy can make any Attempt on this Country with any Hope even of a temporary Succefs.

We are truly fenfible of the Benefits which have refulted from the judicious and falutary Exercife of the extraordinary Powers that were committed by Parliament to your Excellency's Diferetion. Though we fympathize with your Excellency in regretting the Neceffity which has exifted for frequent Exertions of Severity, we are convinced that under the patient, humane, and ferupulous Attention with which your Excellency has ad miniftered that important Truft, no Act of Rigour has been adopted which Juffice did not require, and which was not indifpenfable for the Order and Safety of the State; at the fame Time it is a Subject of the most unfeigned Concern to us, that a Tendency to Outrage fhould fill continue in feveral Dittricts, and that Means fhould be induftrioufly employed for keeping alive the Spirit of Difaffection, and cherifhing the Hope of French Co-operation. We fincerely participate in the Hope which your Excellency has fo forcibly exprefied, that the recent Revolution in France will open the Eyes of thofe who have been deluded by

the Artifices which have been unremittingly employed to withdraw them from their Allegiance; it cannot, we truft, fail to reftore and cherift the Love of Conflitutional Order, and of a genuine and well-regulated Freedom, by demonstrating that the Principles of a falle and spurious Liberty lead only to Despotism and an ignominious Servitude; and that Military Usurpation is the natural Termination to the criminal Efforts of Democratic Faction.

Molt firongly do we feel that fo long as the French Government, whatever Shape it may affume, thall perfevere in Schemes of Deftruction and Projects of Ambition, no lefs fubverfive of the Liberties of Europe than menacing to the Security of His Majefty's Dominions, there can be no wife or fafe Alternative but to inereafe our Efforts in the Profecution of the War, engaged as we are in a Conteft which, by involving the deareft and most valuable Interests of focial Life, calls for all our Confluncy, and an unufual Share of public Spirit. we are thoroughly convinced, that it is by great Exertion alone that thofe Views of Aggrandifement can be fruftrated, or a folid Peace procured.

We have feen with peculiar Satisfaction that His Majefty hath availed himfelf of the cordial and great Affiltance which he has received from hisfaithful Ally the Emperor of Ruffia; and we gratefully acknowledge the wife and prudent Exertions which His Majefty has adopted for augmenting the difpofeable Military Force of his Dominions. The generous Co-operation given to His Majefty's Views on that Occafion by the Englifh Militia has afforded an animating Example of Patriotifm to all Parts of the Empire; and we are convinced that the Militia of this Kingdom will be anxious to prove that they deferve the Confidence His Majefty is pleafed to repofe in their Zeal and Loyalty, by difplaying an equal Ardour for promoting His Majefty's Service, and forwarding, at this important Crifis, the active Operations of the Empire. Imprefied with a full Perfuafion of the beneficial Confequences likely to be derived from the fpeedy Accomplifument of this great and falutary Object, we fhall not fail most cheerfully to concur in the Meafures which fhall appear beft adapted for its Attainment.

The early Precautions which were adopted by your Excellency in Confequence of the Apprehentions that were fome Time fince of a general' Scarcity, demands our grateful Acknowledgments; and your Excellency may rely on our ready Concurrence in giving a Parliamentary Sanction to the judicious and beneficial Meafures which your Excellency has purfued by the Advice of the Council.

We are deeply imprefied with the Wifdom and Policy of continuing that enlarged Syftem of Defence, the Benefit of which has been experienced, and which is calculated to protect the Country from every Danger, whether Foreign or Domeflic, and to render the Succefs of Invation, if attempted, impracticable.

We thank your Excellency for having, ordered the Public Accounts and Effimates for the enfuing Year to be laid before us. Our Zeal for His Majefty's Service, and the Security of the Kingdom, prompt us in a peculiar Manner to make a Provifion adequate to the Exigencies of the Conjuncture;
