Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepran, Efg; Secretary of the Admiralty, dated in Port-Royal Harbour, December 1, 1799.

SIR,

OU will be pleafed to communicate to my Y Lords Commillioners of the Admiralty, that His Majefty's Ship Calypfo arrived here the 21ft of last Month with a Part of the English and Cork Convoys which had been difperfed by a Spanish Squadron off the Mona Paffage. On the 23d Ultimo, His Majelty's Ship Crefcent arrived with the Remainder of the Convoy; the General God-

dard Storeship only excepted. Captain Lobb's Conduct on this Occasion (as their Lordships will perceive by the Copy of his Letter enclosed) was that of a judicious Officer.

Crefcent, Port-Royal, Nov. 22, 1799. SIR, AM exceeding forry to acquaint you, that on A the Dawn of the 15th Inftant, the S. W. End of Porto Rico bearing N. E. Ten or Twelve Leagues, we unfortunately fell in with a Squadron belonging to the Enemy confifting of a Line of

Battle Ship, Frigate, and Corvette. As the Two former were directly in our Courfe on the Larboard Tack, I made the Convoy's Signal to haul to the Wind on the Starboard Tack : made Sail to reconnoitre them; and on joining the Calyplo, (which had previoufly chafed,) perfectly coincided with Captain Baker that they were Enemies; and made Signal to the Convoys for that Purpose.

The Line of Battle Ship and Frigate keeping clofe together, I was in great Hopes of drawing them from the Convoy by keeping within random Shot to Windward, and bore up for that Purpofe, making the Calypio's Signal to chace N. W. the Direction the Body of the Convoy was then in :-at Nine the Enemy tacked, and I was under the

Neceffity of making the Signal to difperfe. The Calypfo bore up for that Part of the Convoy that were running to Leeward. The Corvette which had been feen fome Time before was standing for the Ships that had kept their Wind; I immediately made Sail to relieve them, and had the good Fortune to capture her.

The Enemy were previously chaling the Ships to Leeward; and I was happy to observe them haul their Wind, I fuppofe, on perceiving the Situation of the Corvette ; but this, as well as their other Manœuvres during the Course of the Day appeared fo very undetermined, that they did not take the neceffary Steps to prevent our taking Poffession of her; nor had they brought to any of the Convoy at Dark, notwithstanding they had been near them for Twelve Hours; and their Situation was fuch as to give me fanguine Hopes not any have been. captured.

The Squadron proved to be Spanish, from Saint Domingo bound to the Havannah, confifting of the Afia, of 64 Guns and 550 Men, Commodure Don Francisco Montes.

Amphitrite, of 44 Guns and 360 Men, Captain Don Diego Villagomez.
