A PROCLAMATION,

For granting the Distribution of Prizes taken from the Persons inhabiting the Coasts and Ports of Genoa, and the Territories of the Pope, subsequent to the Twenty-eighth Day of September One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, the Date of His Majesty's Order in Council for granting General Reprisals against the Ships and Goods of the said Persons, then subject to the pretended Authority of Governments styling themselves the Ligurian and Roman Republics.

WHEREAS, by Our Order in Council dated the Twenty-eighth Day of September One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, We have ordered that General Reprisals should be granted against the Ships and Goods belonging to the Persons inhabiting the Coasts and Ports of Genoa and the Territories of the Pope, then subject to the pretended Authority of Governments styling themselves the Ligurian and the Roman Republics, so that, as well Our Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned by Letters of Marque or General Reprisals, or otherwise, by Our Commissioners for executing Our Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships and Goods belonging to the said Persons, and bring the same to Judgment in any of Our Courts of Admiralty within Our Dominions: We, being desirous to give due Encouragement to all Our faithful Subjects who may have lawfully seized any such Ships or Goods subsequent to the said Twenty-eighth Day of September One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, or who shall hereafter seize such Ships or Goods (save and except as to such Ships and Goods belonging to Persons inhabiting the Territories of the Pope, which may have been seized subsequent to the Twenty-seventh Day of September One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, or which shall hereafter be seized,) and having declared in Council Our Intentions concerning the Distribution of all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all such Ships and Goods already seized, or which shall be seized as aforesaid, do now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and all others

whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Will and Pleasure is, that the neat Produce of all such Ships and Goods already taken or which shall be taken as aforesaid, the Right whereof is inherent in Us and Our Crown, be given to the Takers (save and except as aforesaid); and also, save and except the Produce of such Prizes as are or shall be taken by Ships or Vessels belonging to Our Commissioners of Customs or Excise, the Disposition of which We reserve to Our further Pleasure, but subject to the Payment of all such or the like Customs and Duties as the same are now, or would have been liable to, if the same were or might have been imported as Merchandize; and that the same may be so given in the Proportion and Manner hereinafter set forth; that is to say, That all Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels having Commissions of Letters of Marque and Reprisals, (save and except such Prizes as are or shall be taken by the Ships or Vessels belonging to Our Commissioners aforesaid,) may be sold and disposed of by the Merchants, Owners, Fitters, and others, to whom such Letters of Marque and Reprisals are granted, for their own Use and Benefit, after final Adjudication, and not before; and We do hereby further order and direct, That the neat Produce of all Prizes which are or shall be taken as aforesaid by any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, shall be for the entire Benefit and Encouragement of Our Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and other Commissioned Officers in Our Pay, and of the Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on board Our said Ships and Vessels at the Time of the Capture; and that such Prizes may be lawfully sold and disposed of by them and their Agents, after the same shall have been to Us finally adjudged lawful Prize, and not otherwise. The Distribution shall be made as follows; the Whole of the Neat Produce being first divided into Eight equal Parts:

The Captain or Captains of any of Our said Ships or Vessels of War, who shall be actually on board at the taking of any Prize, shall have Three Eighth Parts; but in case any such Prize shall be taken by any of Our Ships or Vessels of War under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers, being actually on board

or directing and assisting in the Capture, shall have One of the said Three Eighth Parts; the said One Eighth Part to be paid to such Flag or Flag Officers in such Proportions, and subject to such Regulations as are hereinafter-mentioned: The Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants, and Master on board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them: but that every Physician appointed, or hereafter to be appointed to a Fleet or Squadron of Our Ships of War, shall, in the Distribution of Prizes which are or shall be taken as aforesaid by the Ships in which he shall serve, or in which such Ship's Company shall be entitled to share, be classed with the Sea Lieutenants with respect to the said One Eighth Part, and be allowed to share equally with them: provided such Physician be actually on board at the Time of taking of such Prizes:

The Lieutenants and Quarter-Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and Quarter-Masters of Land Forces, Secretaries of Admirals or of Commodores, with Captains under them, Boat-swains, Gunners, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mates, Chirurgon, Pilot, and Chaplain on board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Midshipmen, Captain's Clerk, Master Sail-maker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cockswain, Quarter-Masters, Quarter-Masters Mates, Chirurgon's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder-Room, Sergeants of Marines, and Land Forces on board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Trumpeters, Quarter-Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward's Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marines and other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty and assisting on board, shall have Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

Provided, That if any Officer being on board any of Our Ships of War at the Time of taking any Prize, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, such Officer shall be entitled only to the Share or Shares of the Prizes which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his Superior Commission or Office. And We do hereby strictly enjoin all Commanders of our Ships and Vessels of War taking any Prize, as soon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true List of the Names of all the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, who were actually on board Our Ships and Vessels of War under their Command at the Time of the Capture; which List shall contain the Quality of the Service of each Person on board, and be subscribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine, or cause to be examined, such Lists by the Muster Books of such Ships and Vessels of War, and Lists annexed thereto, to see that such Lists do agree with the said Muster Books

and annexed Lists, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others belonging to such Ships and Vessels of War, and upon Request forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any List transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors to take Care and dispose of such Prize; and also upon Application to them (the said Commissioners) they shall give, or cause to be given to the said Agents, all such Lists from the Muster Books of any such Ships of War, and annexed Lists, as the said Agents shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce of such Prizes, and otherwise shall be aiding and assisting to the said Agents in all such Matters as shall be necessary. We do hereby further will and direct, that the following Regulations shall be observed concerning the One Eighth Part hereinbefore-mentioned to be granted to the Flag or Flag Officers who shall actually be on board at the taking of any Prize, or shall be directing or assisting therein: First, That a Flag Officer, Commander in Chief, when there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, shall have to his own Use the said One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels under his Command: Secondly, That a Flag Officer sent to command at Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by Ships or Vessels employed there, before he arrives at the Place to which he is sent, and actually takes upon him the Command: Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag Officer is sent out to reinforce a superior Flag Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the superior Flag Officer shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by the inferior Flag Officer before the inferior Flag Officer shall arrive within the Limits of the Command of the superior Flag Officer, and actually receive some Order from him: Fourthly, That a Chief Flag Officer returning Home from Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by the Ships or Vessels left behind to act under another Command: Fifthly, That if a Flag Officer is sent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by Ships or Vessels, which have sailed from that Port by Order of the Admiralty: Sixthly, That when more Flag Officers than One serve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by any Ships or Vessels of the Fleet or Squadron, shall be divided in the following Proportions; viz. if there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the said One Eighth Part, and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half, and the other Half shall be equally divided amongst the other Flag Officers: Seventhly, That Commodores with Captains under them shall be esteemed as Flag Officers with respect to the Eighth Part of Prizes taken, whether commanding in Chief or serving under Command: Eighthly, That the First Captain to the Admiral and Commander in Chief of Our Fleet, and also the First Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to command a Fleet or Squadron of Twenty Ships of the Line of Battle, and also the First Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to command a Fleet or Squadron of

Fifteen Ships of the Line of Battle, (provided such last mentioned Fleet or Squadron shall be composed of His Majesty's own Ships,) shall be deemed and taken to be a Flag Officer; and shall be entitled to a Part or Share of Prizes, as the junior Flag Officer of such Fleet or Squadron: and We do hereby further order, That in the case of Cutters, Schooners, and other Armed Vessels commanded by Lieutenants, the Share of such Lieutenants shall be Three Eighth Parts of the Prize, unless such Lieutenants shall be under the Command of a Flag Officer or Officers; in which Case the Flag Officer or Officers shall have One of the said Three Eighths, to be divided among such Flag Officer or Officers in the Manner hereinbefore directed in the Case of Captains serving under Flag Officers: Secondly, We direct that the Share of the Master or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the Pilot, (if there happens to be One on board,) shall be One Eighth Part, to be divided into Three equal Parts; of which Two Thirds shall go to the Master or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the remaining One Third to the Pilot; but if there is no Pilot, then such Eighth Part to go wholly to the Master or Person acting as Second in Command: that the Share of the Chirurgion, or Chirurgion's Mate, (where there is no Chirurgion,) Midshipmen, and Clerk and Steward, shall be One Eighth; that the Share of the Boat-swain's, Gunner's, and Carpenter's Mates, Yeomen of the Sheets, Sailmaker, Quarter-Master, and Quarter-Master's Mate, shall be One Eighth; and the Share of the Seamen, Marines, and other Persons on board assisting in the Capture, shall be Two Eighth Parts. But it is Our Intention, nevertheless, that the above Distribution shall only extend to such Captures as shall be made by any Cutter, Schooner, or Armed Vessel, without any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War being present or within Sight of, and aiding to the Encouragement of the Captors, and Terror of the Enemy: but in case any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War shall be present, or in Sight, that then the Officers, Pilots, Petty Officers, and Men on board such Cutters and Schooners, or Armed Vessels, shall share in the same Proportion as is allowed to Persons of the like Rank and Denomination, on board His Majesty's Ships and Vessels of War.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 12th of *February* 1800,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Third Day of July last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, has expired: and whereas it is expedient for His Ma-

jefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom; that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order in Council, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas; any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails; or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store; or ship or lade any of the Articles abovementioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or his Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2.; and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 34, any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Eleventh Day of December last to the contrary notwithstanding: and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Joshua Sydney Horton, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Fairy, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Plymouth-Sound, the 7th Instant.

S I R,

FINDING His Majesty's Ship La Loire has not arrived at this Port with the Pallas National Frigate, having sent a Duplicate of my Proceedings by Captain Newman, I conceive it my Duty to forward you another for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, with the

additional Satisfaction of informing you, that the Pallas was captured close in with the Seven Islands by La Loire, Railleur, Harpy, Danae, and Fairy. Having been joined in the Night of the 6th at Nine o'Clock by La Loire, I desisted giving further Particulars, concluding Captain Newman would state the further Proceedings of the Fairy and Harpy. The Badness of the Weather obliged me to put in here, my standing Rigging, &c. being much cut. I am anxious to save the Post.

SIR,

IN Compliance with your Order of the 3d Instant, His Majesty's Sloop Harpy in Company, having weighed from St. Aubin's Bay at Six A. M. I proceeded to reconnoitre St. Maloes, and at half past Eleven, Cape Frehel bearing S. E. Five or Six Miles, I discovered a large Ship running down close along Shore to the Westward, which I very soon made out to be a large Frigate, and as she did not answer the private Signal, I concluded she was an Enemy, but being so close in Shore, I saw there was no Chance of bringing her to Action, I therefore judged it necessary to tack, with the Hopes of decoying her out from the Land, which fully answered my Wishes, as she immediately gave Chace to us.

At One o'Clock the Harpy having formed close under my Stern, the Enemy arrived within Pistol Shot, when a close Action commenced, and continued until a Quarter before Three, when the Enemy made all Sail from us.—As soon as the Damages the Fairy and Harpy had sustained in the Rigging and Sails (which were very considerable) were repaired, we made all Sail in pursuit of her; at Four o'Clock Three strange Sails were discovered from the Mast-Head to the Northward, which I judged to be a Squadron of English Frigates, to whom I made the Signal for an Enemy, and at Nine were joined by His Majesty's Ships La Loire, Danae, and Railleur, in the Chace.

I must now beg Leave to acknowledge the very able Assistance and Support I received from Captain Bazely in the Harpy, who speaks in the highest Terms of the Conduct of his Officers and Ship's Company, and I cannot conclude without expressing, in the most particular Manner, the Exertions and good Conduct of the Officers and Ship's Company under my Command, and without any Disparagement to the Rest of the Officers, I trust I may be allowed to mention Mr. Smith, (First Lieutenant of the Fairy,) as a very active good Officer. Annexed is a Return of the Killed and Wounded.

Copy of a Letter from Captain James Newman, Commander of His Majesty's Ship La Loire, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Sea the 5th Instant.

SIR,

I Have the Honor to acquaint their Lordships of the Capture of the French National Frigate La Pallas; Citizen Jacque Epion, Commander, by His Majesty's Ship under my Command, after a close Action of two Hours and Ten Minutes, close in Shore under Seven Islands, where she was supported by a Battery. I was most gallantly and ably seconded by Captain Turquand, of His Majesty's Sloop Railleur; and to the Captains of His Majesty's Ship Danae, and Fairy and Harpy Sloops, I feel indebted for their every Exertion to come up with the Chace. I cannot too much applaud the Conduct of the Officers and Crew under my Command, as well as Lieutenant Krenitzin of the Russian Navy; and though I wish not to particularise, I cannot let this Opportunity escape of recommending my First Lieutenant (Mr. Raynor) to their Lordships' Notice as an Officer whose Services I have witnessed on other trying Occasions.

The Pallas is a new Frigate, never at Sea before, mounting Forty-two Guns, Eighteen, Nine, and Thirty-six Pounders, was bound to Brest, victualled for Five Months, and had Three Hundred and Fifty Men on board. I inclose a List of killed and wounded; and am, Sir, &c. &c. &c.

I Have the Pleasure to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that on the 15th Instant, in Lat. 37 Deg. 45 Min. Long. 13 Deg. 8 Min. W. I perceived a Vessel, which suspecting to be a Cruiser, I chased, and by Eight in the Evening, being alongside, she struck without firing a Gun; she proves to be *Le Vulture*, a French Privateer-Ship of Nantz, out Thirty-eight Days, commanded by Citizen Bazile Ang. Eno Laray. She is a remarkably fast Sailer, pierced for Twenty-two Guns, and mounting Four Twelve-Pounders, Two Thirty-six-Pound Carronades, Brads, Sixteen Six-Pounders, Iron, Two of which she threw overboard during the Chace; had on board, when captured, One Hundred and Thirty-seven Men. On my first seeing her, she was in the Act of bearing down on the Brig *Flora* of London, and a Ship, the Name I did not learn, both of which in less than an Hour must inevitably have fallen; but, thus delivered, proceeded on their Voyage.
