Our Magistrates have ordered, that no person shall be permitted to come into this City, without a Certificate of Health.

*Amsterdam, July 5.* We are informed that the French Ambassador at the *Hague*, has presented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein he desires them not to have any jealousy of the Journey which the King his Master is now going to make, for that it is only to visit his Conquests. We are likewise told, that the French have offer'd this Expedient in the matter of the Title of Duke of *Burgundy*, that they will be content the Spaniards shall use it when they Treat with any other Princes, upon condition, they omit it in their Transactions with them. From *Germany* we have an account, that the French attack the Castle of *Falkenberg*.

*Hague, July 5.* The States of *Holland* meet again on Tuesday next, but will not sit above a fortnight, unless something extraordinary happen from abroad. Our last Letters from *Paris* said, that that King continued in the resolution, to possess himself of what he pretends belongs to him in *Flanders*, as Dependences of those places that were yielded to him by the Peace. The Heer *Zitters*, embarked for *England* on Wednesday last with a fair Wind. The Prince and Princess are expected here about the middle of the next week.

*Paris, June 25.* The King will begin his journey for *Flanders* the 15th of the next month, and will, as is said, be abroad till the middle of *September*. The Assembly of the Clergy is going to separate, having granted the King the Three Millions he demanded, which was the main business they were called together for. People continue to discourse variously, concerning our differences with *Rome*, which according to all appearance, are not like to be speedily determined.

*Plymouth, June 25.* On Tuesday sailed from hence the *Assurance*, Captain *Akerman*, and the *Antelope*, Capt. *Story* for *Tangier*; the next day sailed likewise the *Dartmouth* Frigate, Capt. *Churchil*, to cruise to the Westward, and the *Greyhound*, Capt. *Clement* for *Kinsale*, to take in Soldiers for *Tangier*, and yesterday the *Assistance*, Sir *Robert Robinson*, with the Ships under his Convoy, for *Newfoundland*.

*Westminster, June 29.* This day *Richard Radley*, who was the last Assizes in *Essex*, convicted of speaking scandalous words of the Lord Chief Justice *Scroggs*, came to the Court of Kings Bench to receive his Judgment, which was pronounced to be this; That he should stand by the space of an hour, at all the Courts of Westminster-Hall, with a Paper on his Breast, signifying his Offence, that he should at the next Assizes at *Brentwood* in *Essex*, stand in the open Market-place, by the space of two hours, with such a Paper on his Breast, that he pay 200 l. for a Fine to the King, and be im-

prisoned till he pay it, and that he find Sureties for the good Behaviour for three years.

*Westminster, June 30.* This being the last day of the Sixth Term, since the Commitment of Sir *Anthony Dean*, and Mr. *Pepys* to the Tower, and no Evidence for an Indictment, having been offered in all this time against them, notwithstanding their repeated Demand of Tryal, in every of the said Terms, and their giving Bail, in the sum of 60000 l. sterling, for their appearing to any Charge that should be brought against them, they were this day discharged.

Sir *John Gage*, Mr. *Roper*, Mr. *Heveningham*; Mr. *Howard*, and others, were likewise discharged for non-Prosecution; and Sir *Fames Symonds*, Mr. *Dormer*, Mr. *Caryl*, &c. were Bailed.

This day *Richard Radley*, performed that part of his Sentence, of standing with a Paper on his Breast, at all the Courts in *Westminster Hall*.
