WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects,
the Bailiffs, Burgeses, and Inhabitants of the
Town of Ludlow, amongst the warmest and most
zealous of your Majesty's Subjects in Loyalty and
Attachment to your Royal Person and Government,
beg Leave to express the Horror and Indignation
we feel at the late atrocious and treasonable At-
tempt upon your Majesty's most sacred Person, and
humbly to offer our most cordial Congratulations
upon your Escape from the impending Danger.

With all Humility and Gratitude we acknow-
ledge the particular Interposition of Providence in
preventing the traitorous Intention of a daring Af-
fassin being effected upon your Majesty's sacred
Person.

Impressed with a due Sense of your Majesty's
Virtues, and feeling the utmost Gratitude for the
numerous Blessings we enjoy under your mild and
equitable Government, we earnestly pray the Su-
preme Disposer of all human Events to continue to
protect and prolong your Majesty's Life, on which
the Welfare and Happiness of these Kingdoms so
essentially depend.

Westminster, July 2, 1800.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of
Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated
on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis
Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod,
was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the
House of Commons, commanding their Attendance
in the House of Peers. The Commons being come
thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give
the Royal Assent to

An Act for the Union of Great Britain and
Ireland.

An Act to enable Sir George Pigot, Baronet,
Margaret Fisher, and Frances Pigot, to dispose of a
certain Diamond therein mentioned by Lottery.

An Act for enabling the Most Noble Charles
Duke of Richmond, and the Duke of Richmond
for the Time being, to charge with Jointures the
Annuity of Nineteen Thousand Pounds, (payable
out of the Consolidated Fund, in lieu of the Coal
Duty granted by King Charles the Second to
Charles first Duke of Richmond, and the Heirs of
his Body,) and the Stocks on Transfer of which the
said Annuity is made redeemable; and for enabling
the Sale of Part of the said Stocks, and investing
the Money arising from any such Sale in the Pur-
chase of Manors, Lands, and Hereditaments, and
for other Purposes.

Whitehall, July 5, 1800.

The King has been pleased to constitute and
appoint the Right Honorable George John Earl
Spencer, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the
Garter, the Right Honorable Charles George Lord
Arden, of the Kingdom of Ireland, Sir Philip
Stephens, Bart. James Gambier and William Young,
Esqrs. Vice-Admirals of the Blue, Robert Mann,
Esq; Vice-Admiral of the White, and the Honor-
able William Eliot, to be His Majesty's Commis-
sioners for executing the Office of High Admiral
of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, and
the Dominions, Islands, and Territories thereunto
belonging.
