It hath pleafed the Almighty to call your Ma-jefty to the Throne of these Realms at one of those awful Periods when the Judgments of the Lord are manifeftly brought down upon the Earth, and Nations, hardened in Sin and Guilt, fuffer the Punishment of their Impenitence in great national Cala-From the Records of the Divine Proceedmities. ings, we learn how much of our Deliverance from these Calamities we owe to the Protection that has ever been extended by the Supreme Ruler "to good " and godly Kings ruling in Juffice and Equity, " and profeifing and cherifing the holy and eternal " Truth." To the general Degeneracy, breaking To the general Degeneracy, breaking in upon us from fo many Quarters, your Majefty has uniformly oppoled, as well in the Bofom of your Royal Family, as in every Part of your public Con-duct and Deportment, the Example of your Life, in an habitual Veneration for our Holy Religion and all its Ordinances, and in those blamelefs and decorous Manners that add Luffre even to your Majefty's exalted Station; and when an impious Confpiracy had been formed in the Heart of Europe to extinguish the Religion of Chrift, and revive among the Nations of the World the fatal Exceffes from which that Religion had fo generally refcued them, in your Majefty's unfhaken Adherence to its Doctrines and Precepts, and in the Vigor and Energy which, relying on the Divine Promises, you have perfevered in oppoling to all the mad Efforts of its Enemies, not only your Majefty's Subjects, but the Kingdoms around you, have hitherto found their Defence and Safety

With these Sentiments deeply impressed upon our Hearts, could we, the Ministers of Religion, be filent, while all the other Orders of the State, croud round your Majelty's Throne with their Thankfgivings and their Prayers on this renewed Instance of the Divine Protection ?- Long may your Majefty experience the Continuance of that Protection in yourfelf and in your Royal Houfe ! Long may you be, as hitherto, the Inftrument of Good to your faithful and loving Subjects! And when, full of Days and Honor, you fhall be called to the Inheritance of a better Kingdom, may your Virtues be equally hereditary with your Crown, in your illustrious Line! May your Children, and your Childrens' Children reign, as your Majefty has ever done, in the Hearts of a People, fuch as it has been the conflant Object of your Majefty's paternal Wilhes to form-a peaceable, orderly, 

## Whitehall, August 2, 1800.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their feveral Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the followcontrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the follow-ing Abstracts of Alls of Parliament of Their late Majestics King George the First and Second, and of His prefent Majesty, for preventing such Prastices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending

## or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of thefe Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. F any Perfon shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again; he shall be fined at the Difcretion of the Court, and imprifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Arti-ficers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercifing ny of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambaffador, Minister, or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaffador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Perfons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devife, or Purchafe, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majefty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Juffice of Peace, that any Perfon is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Juffice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before jome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witnefs, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sef-fions: And if fuch Perfon shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majefty's Dominions, as fuch Court shall think reafonable, and shall be imprifoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.
