A PROCLAMATION,

For fupprefing Riots and Tumults, and for protecting and encouraging the free Supply of the Markets.

GEORGE R.

THEREAS it has been represented to Us , that riotous Proceedings have taken Place in feveral Parts of Our Kingdom in confequence of the high Price of Provisions, and that in fome Inftances Corn and other Articles of Provision have been violently taken from the Owners, and in others the Prices of those Articles have been re-duced by Threats and Intimidations; We, therefore, having taken the fame into Our most ferious Confideration, and being deeply fenfible of the many milchievous Confequences which mult inevitably enfue to the Peace of Our Kingdom, and to the Lives and Properties of Our loving Subjects, if fuch Proceedings should not be effectually checked; and alfo confidering that the prefent high Price of Corn and other Provisions complained of, inftead of being reduced must nevertarily be increased by the Continuance of fuch Outrages; and that with a View to effecting any permanent Reduction in the Price of Provisions, and enfuring the continued and regular Supply of the accustomed Markets, on which the Sublittence of every Clafs of Our loving Subjects must seceffarily depend, it is effential that the most ample Security be afforded to all Farmers and other lawful Dealers in Corn, and other Arand other lawful Dealers in Corn, and other Ar-ticles of Provision: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby giving Notice of our determined Refolution ef-fectually to exert Our Royal Authority for fup-prefing and punifhing every Attempt tending to impede the regular Supplies of the Market, or to interrupt or diffurb the free Sale of the Articles brought to the fame, by Acts of Violence, or by Intimidation, or by injuring or molefling the Per-Intimidation, or by injuring or molefling the Per-fons or Properties of any fuch Dealers in Corn or other Articles of Provision; and firstly commanding and requiring all the Lieutenants of Our

Counties, and all Our Juftices of the Peace, Sheriffs, and Under Sheriffs, and all Our Civil Officers whatfoever, that they do take the moft effectual Means for fupprefling all Riots and Tumults; and to that End do effectually put in Execution an Act of Parliament madg in the Firft Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Anceftor of Glorious Memory, King George the Firft, inituled "An " Act for preventing. Tumults and Riotous Af-" femblies, and for the more fpeedy and effectual " punifuing the Rioters ;" and all other Laws and Statutes made againft Riots, Routs, and unlawful Affemblies; and do alfo ufe their utmoit Endeavours for difcovering, feizing, and apprehending the Perfons who may be concerned in any fuch riotous and dangerous Practices, to the End that they may be brought to Juffices of the Peace, and all other Our Civil Officers to whom it may appertain, do give the neceffary Directions that fufficient Watch and Ward be duly kept at fuch Times and Places as they fhall judge neceffary for the preventing and fupprefling the like Diforders : And we do hereby further flriftly charge and command all Our Officers Civil and Military, and all other Our løving Subjects, that they be aiding and affifting in the Execution of Our Commands herein, and in the feizing, apprehending, and taking all Perfons who have offended, or fhall offend in Manner aforcfaid ; and we do hereby further charge and command, that the faid Offenders be profecuted according to Law, We being refolved to fupprefs fuch Riots and Tumults by the due Punifhment of all fuch Offenders. And we do hereby command the faid Lieutenants of Our Counties, the refpective Juffices of the Peace, and other Magiftrates aforefaid, that they do, from Time to Time, tranfinit an exact Account of what they fhall do, purfuant to this Our Royal Proclamation, to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

Given at Our Court at Weymouth the Eighteenth Day of September One thousand eight hund dred, in the Fortieth Year of Our Reign.
