Have the Honour to acquaint you, that the Frigates La Justice and La Diane failed from the Harbour of La Valette on the Night of the 24th, and were immediately purfued by His Majefty's Ships off that Port; and that the latter, after a Chace of fome Hours; and a running Fight with the Succefs, ftruck to that Ship, the Genereux, and Northumberland. La Justice, I am forry to add, escaped under Cover of the Night, and has not fince been heard of.

La Diane mounts Forty-two Guns, Eighteen and Nine Pounders, but had only One Hundred and Fourteen Men on board, having left the Remainder to affift in the Defence of the Garrifon.

Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Lord Keith, Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated Foudroyant, Gibraltan-Bay, September 15, 1800.

SIR, MY Letter of the 11th Inflant will have ac-quainted their Lordfhips of my having formed the Refolution of attempting an Enterprize against Two Armed Veffels, reported to be receiving Stores in the Roads of Barcelona for the Relief of Malta. I have now the Satisfaction of informing you, that this Service has been very judicioully arranged by Captain Louis of the Minotaur, and most gallantly and fuccessfully executed by Captain Hillyer of the Niger, and Lieutenant Schomberg of the Minotaur, in the Boats of thefe Ships, as will appear by the Report made to me thereon by Captain Louis, a Copy of which is herewith enclosed. I have no Doubt that their Lordships will justly appreciate the Merits

Service has been performed.

MY LORD, Minotaur, Sept. 6, 1800. lying in Barcelona Road, mentioned in your Lordfhip's Orders to Captain Oliver ; and, in order to check the Two Ships failing upon this intended fccret Expedition, induced me to perfevere in the following Attempt :

On the Evening of the 3d Inflant, after having delivered Captain Hillyer of the Niger his Orders to join your Lordship, a Breeze sprung up from the Westward, with every Appearance of a close Night. I again called him on board, with the Signal at the fame Time to prepare Boats. Captain Hillyer and Lieutenant Schomberg volunteered the Service, af-fifted by Lieutenants Warrand, Lowry, Lieutenant Healy of the Niger, Mr. Reid, Master, and Lieute-nant Jewell of the Marines. The Boats left the Minotaur about Eight o'Clock in the Evening. The Firing began from all Quarters near Nine: about Ten o'Clock I had the pleafing Satisfaction to fee Two Ships dropping out of the Road under a heavy Fire from the Ships, Four strong Batteries, Ten Gun-Boats, Two Schooners, with Two Forty-two Pounders each-the Fort of Mount Joui the fame Time throwing Shells.—The Minotaur and Niger were well placed in good Seafon to cover the Party. The Service was performed throughout with an enterprifing Spirit, good Conduct, and in a gallant Stile. The Lois, which I shall inform your Lordship, of Killed and Wounded fell principally upon Two Boats, not great, when compared to the Situation the Number of Boats. and fo many Men were placed in for a confiderable The Ships about Eleven o'Clock were per-Time. fectly clear from the Fire of the Enemy's Batteries and Gun-Boats, the Men of War checking the Movements of the latter: the Ships captured, named Conception alias Efmiralda, and La Paz, about Four Hundred Tons, each mounting Twentytwo Brass Guns, Twelve and Nine-Pounders, laden. with Provisions and Stores, &c. &c. fuppofed for Batavia, and on Dutch Account : they were tohave taken Three Hundred Troops of the Regiments of Batavian Swifs on board from the Island of Majorca. I found feveral Dutch Officers on board the Efiniralda. The Officers and feveral of the Men of La Paz, during the Action, quitted her in Boats. La Paz is a very fine Ship, quite new, never at Sea before, fails remarkably well, and I make no-Doubt your Lordfhip will find her in all Respects. calculated for His Majefty's Service; the Efmiralda is also a very fine Ship. I beg Leave ftrongly to-recommend to your Lordfhip's Notice Captain Hillyer and Lieutenant Schomberg; their Services upon this Occasion deferve the first Attention and highest Praise; at the same Time I cannot pass without Notice the general good Conduct of every-Officer and Man ferving under my Command. L herewith fend the Lift of Killed and Wounded.
