I was unable to afcertain what was my exact Situation till the Day broke, and as it was Ebb Tide when we went on Shore, I was prevented from getting off before. In the Morning having got the Ship under weigh, and worked off from the Land, finding myfelf able to keep the Sea, I returned to my Station; and the next Morning, (the 24th,) I feil in with a French Schooner Letter of Marque, bringing Coffee and Sugar from Guadaloupe to Bourdeaux, but a Guernfey Privateer Lugger who was also in Sight, and nearer to the Schooner than

The Veffels taken and deftroyed as per Margin \*, exclusive of the above Capture, is the Sum of our Succefs.
