Your conduct in this Parish Fulham is such as Deserves Immediate resentment you cannot suppose but you Comm^d Men and not Reptiles as you call them Your House shall be Fired you Person without great precaution will suffer if ever we aboute Ten in the Association will you may depend fire Ball which I hope will put an ultimatum to you Command Sir — and you attempt to set yourself up as a Man of good reputation.

I beg leave to say unless you take great precaution you shall not Live long in this Parish Fulham, we associate to encourage Monopoly and bring on distress on ourselves and Family the Time is near when Men will act For themselves and not for others.
