Tangier, June 16.

HE 6th Inflant the Earl of Inchiquin parted from hence for England. Sir Palmes Fairborne, who now Commands in chief is finishing the Work began by Vice-Admiral Herbert, and is doing several other things which will add to the strength of the place. The Mores keep a Guard of 400 Foot, besides their Horse, in their Trenches, who are relieved every Morning. We have advice that at Sally they are fitting out 10 Men of War mounted from 8 to 20 Guns each; and that two of the Algierines which some time sance were engaged with Captain Pin in the Hampsbire, to secure themselves put into Sally, where one of them of 24 Guns, striking upon the Bar, was broke in piccess.

Madrid, June 30. The last week the King and the Queen were entertained with a Bull Feast, and 30 Bulls were killed, though not without the wounding of several of the Combatants. The Prince of Parma is preparing for his departure for Flanders, to enter upon the Government of those Countries; it's believed he will take his Journey by land through France. The Count de Gubernats, Envoy from Savoy, has orders to remain here till the arrival of the Marquis de Dronero, who comes from that Court with the Character of Ambassador.

Genoua, July 10. This week the Ruby, Captain Smith, returned from the Rivera to attend here the coming of the Convoy from Spain, which is hourly expected. There are in this Port fix English Merchant ships more bound home. At Final are arrived three great Dutch Ships from Cadiz and Alicant, having on Board 1400 Soldiers for the Service of the State of Milan, and 3000 more are daily expected. The 12 French Galleys are by reason of the bad Weather got no farther then Porto Venero.

Stockbolm, June 30. The King came lither five days fince, and has been twice in the Senate. The Sieur Lyonberg is preparing to return for England, as Envoy Extraordinary from this Crown. The King has named Count Bengt Oxenstern to be Governor of Schonen.

Hamburg, Fuly 13. The last French Post brought hither Bills of Exchange for 100000 Crowns, to be paid to the Duke of Zed, who upon Receipt of this money will quit Boxthoede. The King of Suedden has confirmed to the City of Straelfond their Priviledges. The King of Denmark was according to our last advice still at Gluckstadt.

Strasburg, July 16. From Augsburg they write that Count Mansfeldt, the Emperors Envoy Extraordizary to the French King, would part from thence, in few days on his way to France, having performed his Quarantine. The Baron de Monclas continues Encamped near Landam. It is fill reported

that the Mareschal de Crequi will come and Command an Army in these parts.

Francfort, July 18. The Elector Palatine having caused the late Governor of the Castle of Falkenburg to be Tried before a Council of War, for having furrendred the same to the French, when he was in a condition to have defended it, he was Condemned and Sentenced to be Beheaded, which has been accordingly Executed. The Plague grows more and more violent at Prague, there dying room and 1200 weekly. The Imperial Court is at present at Lintz, and will continue there till November, when it will return to Vienna. . The Empress is several Months gone with Child, to the great joy of that Court. From Munick we have an account, That the 11th Instant the Elector of Bavaria was declared to be at Age, which was done with much Solemnity, and that his Electoral Highness had taken the Government upon himself. There is a discourse of a Marriage between him and a Daughter of the Duke of Newburg.

Cologne July 23. The first Instant arrived here the Earl of Middleton, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of England to the Emperor, and yesterdly he parted again to persue his Journey. What is written from Straiburg concerning the Mareichal de Crequi's coming to Command an Army in Alface merits little Credir, and we are told from good hands that the French Cavalry now in Alface, is ordered to march to the Saar, to joyn the Dragoons Commanded by the Marquis de Boussiers, and then to march together towards the Meuse to meet the King about the middle of the next Month, and to Muster in his presence.

Amsterdam, July 26. We have an account from Heusden of a very sad accident that happened there the 24th Instant, The L ghtning having in the night pierced the Wall of the great Tower, where was kept a great Quantity of Powder, and set sire to it, the said Tower, the Cassle, and greatest part of the Street adjoying were Blown up, and the rest of the Town extreamy torn and shattered; about 60 persons are known to have been killed, and about 200 more are missing; the farther particulars we as yet know not, but in general it is said that the Damages are greater then what were suffered at Pelf in the year 1654.
