

Prince and Princess of *Orange*, with all the chief persons of the Court, were entertained at *Sorgholiet*, by the *Sieur Benting*, and this day his Highness dined with *Mr. Sidney*. 'Tis believed the French Ambassador will go and wait upon the King his Master in *Flanders*, so soon as the States of *Holland* separate, which they will do some time the next week.

Bruges, July 20. The French King has add'd a month to the term set by him, for the Spanish Commissioners at *Courtray*, to procure a new Power in, without the Title of Duke of *Burgundy*. The Cannon and Ammunition that were at *Dixmuyde* are removed from thence to *Newport*, and the Garrison will follow, so soon as the Fortifications are demolished; At the same time they are going to add new ones to *Newport*.

Brussels, July 19. The Duke de *Villa Hermosa* will not part for *Flanders* till the middle of the next week, that he may first receive the Spanish Letters, that are expected on Wednesday; those Letters will tell us, when the Prince of *Parma* may be expected here; In the mean time we know, that he intends to come through *France*, with the Duke of *Montalto*, General of our Horse, and that he has already sent a Gentleman to the French Court, to demand the necessary Passports. *Dixmuyde* is going to be demolished, and the Troops that are there are to march to *Newport*, to strengthen that Garrison, which will be then 4000 Men.

Brussels, July 23. His Excellency has made choice of the Marquis de *Warynés*, Governor of *Courtray*, to go and Complement the most Christian King, upon his arrival in *Flanders*. General *Spaen* is come hither to sollicite the payment of the Arrears of Contributions, due to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and of 30 000 Crowns which he pretends to be owing to himself, by the Crown of *Spain*.

Lille, July 24. The French King, the Queen, and the whole Court, are come to *Dunkirk*; and we expect them here the first of the next month. The Spaniards continue jealous of our Kings Designs, which appears by their demolishing *Lixmuyde*, and reinforcing the Garrison of *Newport*.

Raris, July 24. There are some Letters from the Court which say, that the Queen and the Ladies would not accompany the King farther than *Dunkirk* or *Lille*, and others tell us, that the King himself will return much sooner than he at first intended. An Express arriv'd here this week in eight days from *Rome*, the differences with that Court seem not to be in any way of Composition; and its not doubted, but the Pope will be much offended at the Letter writ to the King, by the Assembly of the Clergy, on occasion thereof, when he sees it; and even people here, make different Reflections upon it.

Plymouth, July 16. Yesterday was destroyed here by the Officers of the Custom-House, about 30 Tuns of French Wine, Brandy, Vinegar, and about 2000 lb. worth of French Dوقاس, and Canvas, in pursuance of the late Act of Parliament.

Lima, July 17. We have an account of the loss of the Providence of this Place, who being homeward bound from *Virginia* in May last, sprung a Leak, off of *Cape St. Vincent*, and within 24 hours sunk down, only six men of the crew saving themselves in their Boat.

Whitehall, July 20. Complaint having some days past been made to His Majesty of a great Riot and Insolence committed upon the House of the Count de *Pertevque*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, (while

he was absent at *Windsor* His Majesty being sensible of this great affront done to the Character of a Foreign Minister, contrary to the Law of Nations, was pleas'd in Council to order, That the Persons who committed the said Fact should, by a Commission of Oyer and Terminer, be Tryed for the same and Prosecuted according to Law with the utmost severity, and that Mr. Attorney General should take care in it accordingly.

Whitehall, July 20. Last night His Majesty and His Royal Highness, Attended with several of the Nobility, did Sir *Simon Lewes*, one of the Sheriffs of *London*, the Honor to Sup with him at *Fishmongers-Hall*, where he keeps his Shrievalty, and were extremely pleas'd with their Entertainment, which was Noble, and in very good order.

This Evening the King returned to *Windsor*.
