**A** Printed Hand Bill of the most seditious and inflammatory Tendency, and highly dangerous to the publick Peace and Tranquillity, having been secretly distributed, inviting a tumultuous and unlawful Assembly to meet on Kennington Common on Sunday the 9th Instant; and it being important to the publick Welfare, that the Author, Printer, and Publisher of the said Hand Bill should be discovered and made amenable to public Justice, as a Warning and Example to others in like Case offending, a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS,

(to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury,) will be given to any Person who shall discover the Author, Printer, or Publisher of the said Hand Bill, so that he or they may be convicted of writing, printing, or publishing the same.

**W**Hereas it has been humbly represented unto the King, that an anonymous Letter was received, on Tuesday the 21st Ultimo, by Mr. John Ackers, Governor of the House of Industry at Whitechurch, in the County of Salop, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

**W**Hereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that some evil-minded Person or Persons did, on the 23d or 24th Ultimo, place a Piece of burning Wood wrapt up in some old Thatch under a Barn filled with Stubble, the Property of Joseph Goodale Baker, of Withersfield, in the County of Suffolk;

And whereas it has also been humbly represented to the King, that some Person or Persons on the Morning of the 24th Ultimo, did feloniously and maliciously set fire to a Hay Stack, the Property of Thomas Flack, of the Parish of Haverhill, in the said County;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the abovementioned Felonies, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Persons who actually placed the said burning Wood under the Barn, or set fire to the said Hay Stack,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of TEN GUINEAS is hereby offered by the Inhabitants of the Parish of Withersfield, in Addition to a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS also offered by the Norwich Insurance Office to any Person making Discovery of the Persons concerned in attempting to set fire to the said Barn, (except as is before excepted,) to be paid on the Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.

As also a Reward of FIFTY GUINEAS is hereby offered by the Inhabitants of the Parish of Haverhill, to any Person making Discovery of the Persons concerned in setting Fire to the said Hay Stack (except as is before excepted), to be paid on the Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.
