A PROCLAMATION.  
 GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS an Address has been presented to Us by Our Two Houses of Parliament, requesting Us to issue Our Royal Proclamation, recommending to all such Persons as have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food the greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: We, having taken the said Address into Consideration; and being persuaded that the Prevention of all unnecessary Consumption of Corn will furnish one of the surest and most effectual Means of alleviating the present Pressure, and of providing for the necessary Demands of the Year, have, therefore, in pursuance of the said Address, and out of Our tender Concern for the Welfare of Our People, thought fit (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, most earnestly exhorting and charging all those of Our loving Subjects who have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food than Corn, as they tender their own immediate Interests, and feel for the Wants of others, to practise the greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: And We do, for this Purpose, more particularly exhort and charge all Masters of Families to reduce the Consumption of Bread in their respective Families, by at least One-Third of the Quantity consumed in ordinary Times, and in no Case to suffer the same to exceed One Quartern Loaf for each Person in each Week; to abstain from the Use of Flour in Pastry, and, moreover, carefully to restrict the Use thereof in all other Articles than Bread: And do also, in like Manner, exhort and charge all Persons who keep Horses, especially Horses for Pleasure, as far as their respective Circumstances will admit, carefully to restrict the Consumption of Oats and other Grain

for the Subsistence of the same. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, within the Kingdom of Great Britain, to read, or cause to be read, Our said Proclamation, on the Lord's Day, for Two successive Weeks after receiving the said Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Third Day of December One thousand eight hundred, in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

**A**T the Court at St. James's, the 3d of December 1800,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Island of Curaçoa and its Dependencies, has been surrendered and placed under the immediate Protection of His Majesty's Arms, and the Territory and Forts of the same are delivered up to His Majesty, and the said Island is now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Island of Curaçoa, subject nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies, is or shall be subject by Law.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said Island of Curaçoa, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to



the said Orders, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies; and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury; and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-eighth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-eighth Day of May last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Tenth Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export; transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to *Ireland*, or to His Majesty's Islands of *Guernsey*, *Jersey*, *Alderney*, *Sark*, or *Man*, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in *America* or the *West Indies*, or to *Newfoundland*, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of *Africa*, or to the Island of *St. Helena*, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the *East Indies*: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to *Ireland*, or to His Majesty's Islands of *Guernsey*, *Jersey*, *Alderney*, *Sark*, or *Man*, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in *America* or the *West Indies*, or to the Island of *Newfoundland*, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of *Africa*, or to the

Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ* has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Bond, commanding His Majesty's Schooner the *Netley*, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Lisbon, the 11th November 1800.

S I R,

I Have the Honor to forward, for the Inspection of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, Copies of Two Letters which I have written to Captain Halsted, of His Majesty's Ship *Phœnix*; and have the Honor to be, Sir, &c. &c. &c.

S I R; *Netley, in the Tagus, Nov. 9, 1800.*

AFTER receiving your Orders to put myself under your Command, I failed hence on the 5th of September with a Convoy for Oporto, at which Place they arrived safe on the 11th following.

I have the Pleasure to acquaint you, that in His Majesty's Schooner we captured, on the 28th of the same Month, the Spanish Privateer *Noltra Sanora*

the *Carmen La Confianza*, of Two Guns and Twenty-six Men; and that on the 16th Ultimo we retook the Brig *Mary* from Dublin, and the *Lial Invieta Vianna*, a Portuguese Government Lugger of Seven Guns, both which had been captured the preceding Day by a French Privateer of Fourteen Guns, the latter after an Action of Half an Hour.

As the *Mary* had on the 14th been cut from her Anchorage under the Fort of Saint John's, by a Spanish Row Boat, the Governor of Vianna thought it necessary to intercept her, and accordingly sent the Lugger on that Service; when both fell into the Hands of the French: The Crew of the *Netley* have in consequence given up, free of Salvage, the *Lial Invieta Vianna* to the Order of His Excellency M. Pedro de Millo.

SIR, *Netley, River Tagus, Nov. 18, 1800.*

IN Addition to my Letter of Yesterday's Date which I had the Pleasure of writing, I beg Leave to acquaint you, that on my Arrival off the Rock of Lisbon, on the 7th Instant, Information was given of a Spanish Privateer Schooner lurking in the Neighbourhood, and that the Newfoundland Convoy being dispersed, were daily approaching the Tagus; at Night a Pilot Boat acquainted me of the recent Capture of a Brig loaded with Salt Fish, which induced me to close with the Shore in the Hope of intercepting her; she had been taken Eighteen Hours before, during light Winds, in Sight of a Remnant of the Convoy then in the Offing: The Privateer and her Prize, the *Hunter of Greenock*, were discovered by us in the Dark at Anchor; while the Boat was dispatched to the Brig we run the other on board, dropped our Anchor, and, without Mischief or Firing, took Possession of her though they were at Quarters; she is called the *St. Miguel*, alias *Alertta*, of Nine Guns, Eighteens and Sixes, and Sixty-five Men, had been off the Stocks about Two Months, and sailed from the River *Pontevedra*; we all Three anchored within *St. Juliens* the same Day.
