Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that an anonymous threatening Letter has been sent to Lady Glynn, of Farmcott, Bridgnorth, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

We wrote to you sometime ago desiring you to compell your Tenants to sell Corn out to the Poor at a lower price no notice as been taken of our letter but laughd at by your Tenants mentiond in the letter, you shall soon see whether or not our threats are put in execution, as well as several others, that we wrote to—The building mentiond in our first letter would by this time have been burnt to the ground but our receipt for combustable was not a good one it miss'd but one we have now will not miss you may depend upon it—The time is not far off when most of the Farmers and Millars shall suffer part of them we will cut off their Ears and slit their Nuses to the Bone as a mark that the country may know them and those mentin'd in our letter shall, hang as we have describ'd.—When we can all settle it to meet together we do not fear the Solders sent to keep peace three parts out of four have sworn to join us when they are sure we are a body sufficient to conquer and that we are already we only wait for orders from our leaders which are some of the first Gentlemen in the kingdom. we wrote to you by their direction and orders that you might save your life and buildings but now you have treated our warning with contempt you shall suffer with the rest, It was not for the sake of the Farmers occupying your Farms mentiond in our first letter that we wrote to you but for your sake only

the Farmers mention'd are the worst of all Farmers —We have found out as great a rogue since we wrote to you before as the other we are informed of one Batch of the Green House who has bought 200 Acres of Corn growing for 8s a strike and will not sell it 'till it is at 30s we are determind to have part with him before he is much older but if We cannot have our share we will burn it to the Ground that he may dam as well as we we are inform'd also of Wilson and Waldron of Bebridge Wilson of Arly and a Tonge of the Park who have thrashed 7 or 8 hunderd strike and hid it in the chaff. We have distributed Notes to Wolverhampton Dudley Stourbridge lie waste Brignorth to let our Friends know of the above person that they may know where to find Corn. out of all the Farmers for 15 Miles round W. Hampton we can only find 3 Good ones and those we will protect to our last drop of Blood and any Friends they shall wish. We hav in a letter drop'd let our Friends know who the are that they may be safe and we shall soon send them our pass word but if they expose it that any other may know it they will suffer with the rest.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the said Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
