

hither by Bills of Exchange from *France*; so that now *Boexboede* will be delivered up to the Swedes, in very few days. Sir *Gabriel Syvius*, the King of *Englands* Envoyc to the Princes of *Lunenburg*, continues at *Zell*.

Cologne, Aug. 2. Yesterday the Deputies appointed by our Elector, and the Prince of *Orange* met for the first time, for the determining certain differences, depending between this Archbishoprick, and the County of *Meurs*. The Marschal de *Cregui* is come into *Alsace*, has been at *Friburg* and other places to view the Fortifications, which seems to be the chief occasion of his journey. The Countrey of *Fuliers* has not yet satisfied the Arrears of Contributions which the French Demand. From *Metz* they write, that the French King will be in *Alsace* about the middle of *August*; and that the Troops Commanded by the Marquis de *Boufflers*, are to march to *Stenay* to meet him.

Cologne, Aug. 6. Our Magistrates have resolved to raise the Hundredth penny upon the Inhabitants of this City, which Moneys will be employed for the raising of Men, to reinforce our Garrison. We are told, that the Duches of *Fuliers*, in compassion to those poor people that are threatened by the French with Military execution, for want of paying their Arrears of Contributions, has offered to pawn her Jewels, and furnish them with Moneys to do it.

Hague, Aug. 9. This Place, in the absence of the States of *Holland*, and the Prince of *Orange*, is at present very barren of News. The Duke of *Bouillon*, and the Countess of *Soissons* are at *Amsterdam*, incognito, where they will spend some days in viewing the Curiosities of that City.

Brussels, Aug. 9. Lieutenant-General *Spaen*, who was sent hither by the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to sollicite the payment of the Arrears of Subsidies, which his Electoral Highness pretends to be due to him, is returned for *Berlin*, having received what was owing to himself, and an assurance from the Duke of *Villa Hermosa*, that he will do his best endeavours upon his arrival at *Madrid*, to obtain the Elector satisfaction. Last night arrived the Spanish Ordinary, with Letters from *Madrid*, of the 25th past, they tell us, that by the next, will be remitted hither 600000 Crowns. That the Prince of *Parma* would part from *Madrid* some time the next month, that he would not pass through *France*, as he at first resolved, but would go by Sea, and that it was said, he would have Orders to take *England* in his way. That the King of *Spain* had Ratified the Treaty of Alliance, lately concluded between the King of *England* and him; and that in consideration of the good Service performed on occasion thereof, by Don *Pedro de Ronquillo*, his Minister in *England*, he had given him a yearly Pension of 2000 Crowns, and made him of the Council of *Castile*. His Excellency will go for *Flanders* some day the next week.

Paris, Aug. 10. The first Instant their Majesties and the whole Court, parted from *Spres*, and in the Evening arrived at *Lille*, the Garison being in Arms, and the Regiments of the Dauphin, of *Magalotti*, &c. being drawn up in the Plain before the Cittadel, where, as the King passed, the Dauphin at the head of his Regiment, saluted him with his Half Pike. The next day the King visited the Fortifications, and the third parted again for *Tournay*; being received there by the Marquis de *Monbrun*, his Majesties Lieutenant-General in *Flanders*, and Governor of

that City. The 5th the King went from thence to *Valenciennes*, in his way near *Condé* he visited the Camp of Monsieur de *Monbrun*, where eight Regiments of Horse were drawn up in Battallia. At *Condé* the King caused the Sluyces to be opened, and visited the Fortifications. In the Evening their Majesties arrived at *Valenciennes*, where they were received by Count *Bardi Magalotti* the Governour, and the Magistrates. The next day the King gave Audience to the Heer *Van Zuytlestein*, Envoye Extraordinary from the States-General, by whom he was sent to Compliment his Majesty, upon his arrival in those parts. From *Alsace* they write, of the 28th past, that the Marschal de *Cregui* was arrived in those parts to visit *Brisac*, *Friburg*, *Hunningen*, and *Schlestadt*, and the Fortifications that are making on the *Saar*, after which, he would return to his Government of *Lorraine*.

Portsmouth, Aug. 1. Since my last, some of the Merchant Ships are gone for *Plymouth*, the rest, with the *Sweepstakes*, weighed from *St. Helens* for fear of ill weather, and are now Riding in *Stoak-Bay*. On Friday the *Faulcon* Frigate, Capt. *Bounty* Commander, came to an Anchor at *Spithead*.

Whitby, Aug. 3. The arrival lately at *Tangier*, of a good Recruit of Forces, both from *England* and *Ireland*, as it was welcome to all, so the Lieutenant-Governor hath thereupon thought fit to give such particular Assurances, concerning the place, as became a Person of his Station and Merit.

The Alcaide hath also agreed to the enlarging of the Bounds, so as our Horse and Foot may have the free Liberty, and Commodity of the Fields within those Limits, without any molestation.
