HIS Majesty's Commiſſioners for managing the Stamp Duties do hereby give Notice, that, by a Clause in an Act of the preſent Seſſion of Parliament, Cap. 22. it is enacted, for Remedy of the Inconvenience which has ariſen and may ariſe to Maſters and Miſtreſſes of Apprentices, and alſo to Apprentices, in reſpect to Indentures of Apprenticeship made for the binding Poor Children and others, which have, through Miſtake or Inadvertency, been executed upon Stamps of a different Denomination and Value than required by the ſeveral Acts relating to the Stamp Duties, and therefore are not valid or binding on any of the Parties thereto, that, upon Payment on or before the 31ſt Day of December 1801, of the FULL RATE OR DUTY payable on any ſuch Indenture; or on the Production at this Office of any Indenture of Apprenticeship, where the ſame ſhall have been ſtamped with any Stamp of a higher Value, though of a different Denomination than is required by Law, and tendering the ſame to be ſtamped to the proper Officer at the ſaid Office, every ſuch Indenture ſhall be ſtamped without Payment of any Penalty whatever; and being ſo ſtamped with the proper Stamp (whether done during the Time mentioned therein, or after the Expiration thereof) ſhall thereupon be good and valid, and the Perſons who have incurred any Penalty by ſuch Neglect or Omiſſion, are indemnified againſt the ſame, except only in ſuch Caſes where any Proſecution ſhall be now depending.
