accompanied with the News of the French King's b i g on his Return homewards, is very acceptable to people here, and has made the Actions of the Exti-India company rife very confiderably: Yeilei day the Heer Van Zuylellein returned hither from the Fr nch Court, where he had been to Compliment that King in the name of the States General; he made his Report to the States this Morning, and will go and do the like to the Prince of Orange, who is now at Dieren. The Electoral Prince Palatine is daily expected here, in his way for Ergland: His H ghness, during his stay here, will Lodge at Mr. sidney's, who went on Wednesday last to wait upon the Prince of Orange at Dieren, There remaining yet due from this State to the Duke of Newurg 40 thou fund Crowns, upon the account of Sublidies, which the States refuse to pay till the Elector of C logne hath fatisfied them in what they demand of him, we are told that the Duke of Newburg has affigued the faid Sum to the French, who are to Deduct so much of the Contributions they pretend of the Country of fu'iers.

Amsterdam, Aug. 16. Yosler lay arrived here the Elect ral Prince Palurine and his Princels: To mortow th y will part from hence again, the Prince to Embark for England, and the Princels on her Journey for Denmark, being Sister to that King. The Actions of the East-India Company are now at 446, they having of late risen very considerably upon the confidence people have that the Peace they now on oy will continue undiffurbed. The States, upon the complaint of those of Argiers, have resolved to recall the Conful they have there, and to appoint another in his stead, and at the same time have admitted the Sieur Louis d' Azevedo as Resident of the Government of Argiers. The Prince of Orange is at present at his House at Dieren, and he will not be back at the Hague till the latter end of this Month.

Bruffels, Aug. 15. On Wednesday last the Duke of Bouillon returned hither from Holland, having left the Countess of Soissons at Amsterdam, where she stays to meet the Dutchess of Mazarine. The Duke of Bouillon parted from hence again yesterday, to joyn the Court at Philipville. We are told that 1500 of the Kings Guards went back with the Prince of Conde for Paris, when he left the King at Cambray. The time of the Duke de Villa Hermosa's Journey for Flanders is very uncertain, there being some stop in the matter of the moneys which he some stays since concerted with the sour Members of Flanders.

Eruste s, Aug. 16. We cannot yet learn what the Extraordinany Courier, which arrived here three or four days fince from Madrid, brought, and we are the less inquisitive concerning it, since we understand the French King has prolonged the Term about the Business of Burgundy till the 15th of the next Month, in which time it is hoped some expedient will be found to compose that matter, and to prevent the ill consequences it may otherwise have. The French Court will be to morrow at Rocroy, and the next day at Maxieres, and from thence will return towards Paris. The States of Brabant have granted a Months Pay to the Troops in that Province, and it's expected those of Namur will do the like. There is Published a long Narrative of what passed at Barcelona upon the Duke de Vivonne's Arrival before that place, though in subflance it contains no more then That the faid Duke

Paris, Aug. 17. The last Letters we had from the Court lett their Majesties at Philipville, and now we expect quickly to hear that their Majesties are on their return hither. The Heer Van Starenberg, Ambassador to our King from the States-General of the United Provinces, is arrived here; and the Heer Boreel, whom he found here in that quality, is preparing for his return home.

Paris, Aug. 18. The Prince of Conde is come back to Chuntilly; and we are told that their Maj-flies will be at St. Germains before the end of this Month, so that the Jealousies v hich the Kings Journey at first give our Neighbours, are now sufficiently ren oved.

Stockton, Aug. 10. Several Casks of French Wine were this day destroyed here by the Officers of the Custom-House, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament

Lime, Aug. 11. A confiderable quantity of French Goods having been Seized here, and Condemned this Morning 33 Casks of Wine and Brandy were destroyed by the Officers of the Custom-House and in few days a parcel of Linnen of great value will be burnt, according to the late Act of Parliament.
