PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the
King, that there are at this Time several Deferters from the different regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Olice of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that fuch an infiance of Ilis Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour: His Majesty has been gracioufly pleafed to grant his Free Pardon to all Deferters from his regular Land Forces, who shall furrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of September next, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whole

Such Deferters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be fent to the Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to fuch Regiments as His Majelly may be pleafed to command; and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the faid Deferters may have enlifted in other regular Corps, and are now ferving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct, that they shall continue to

ferve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deferters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly ferved: But this Claufe is not to extend to Deferters enlitted by the Corps railing Recruits for General Service; which Deferters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves in the Isle of Wight to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regi-

Any Soldier who may defert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

And every OF ficer who shall neglect to make his Report, either to the Commander of a Diffrict or to the Secretary at War, according to the Circumflances of his Eliuntion, within One Month from the Date herror, will be confidered as otherwife provided for, or det.4, and his Name will be flruck off the Half-Pay Lift arcordingly.
