frongly posted, and in a Country which opposed uncommon Obstacles to the Progress of Troops. The French suffered extremely in the Action, and re treated in much Confusion, leaving their Wounded and Seven Pieces of Cannon behind them.

On the 24th, Batteries were opened against the Reboubt de Bain; and on the 25th, at Night, Major-General Coote furprifed the Enemy's Advanced Polts, when Seven Officers and Fifty Men were taken Prifoners; this Service was gallantly performed by Lieutenant-Colonel Smith, with the 1st Battalion of the 20th Regiment, and a fmall Detachment of Dragoons under the Orders of Lieutenant Kelly, of the 26th. The Enemy endeavoured to regain Postefilon of the Ground from which they had been driven, but were repulsed with Lofs.

On the Morning of the 26th we opened Four Batterics on each Side of the Town against the intrenched Camp of the French, which foon filenced their Fire, and induced them to withdraw many of their Guns.

On the 27th, in the Evening, General Menou fent an Aid-de-Camp to requeft an Armiftice for Three Days, in order to give Time to prepare a Capitulation, which, after fome Difficulties and Delays, was figned on the 2d of September. I have the Honor to enclose you a Copy of the

I have the Honor to enclose you a Copy of the Capitulation, and also a Lift of the Number of Perfons for whom the Enemy have required Shipping; by this it appears, that the Total of the Carrifor of Alexandria confisted of upwards of Eight Thousand Soldiers, and One Thousand Three Hundred Sailors.

This arduous and important Service has at length been brought to a Conclusion. The Exertions of Individuals have been fplendid and meritorious. regret that the Lounds of a Difpatch will not allow me to specify the Whole, or to mention the Name of every Perfon who has diftinguished himfelf in the public Service. I have received the greatest Sup-port and Affiliance from the General Officers of the Army. The Conduct of the Troops of every Defcription has been exemplary in the highest Degree; there has been much to applaud and nothing to reprehend; their Order and Regularity in the Camp have been as confpicuous as their Courage in the Field. To the Quarter-Maller General Lieutenant Colonel Auftruther I owe much for his unwearied Induly and Zeal in the public Service, and for the Aid, Advice, and Co-operation, which he has at all Times afforded me. Brigadier-General Lawfon, who commanded the Artillery, and Captain Bryce, the Chief Engineer, have both great Merit in their different Departments. The local Situation of Lgypt prefents Oldtacles of a moft ferious Kind to military Operations on an extended Scale. The Skill and Perfeverance of those Two Officers have overcome Difficulties which at first appeared almost infurmountable.

Lieutenant'Colonel Lindenthal, who has always afted with the Turks, deferves my utmost Acknowledgments; his Aftivity and Diligence have been unremitted, and he has introduced amongst them an Order and Regularity which does him the highest Honor.

During the Course of the long Service on which we have been engaged, Lord Keith has, at all Times, given me the molt able Afhitance and Counfel. The Labour and Fatigue of the Navy have been continued and exceffive ;—it have not been of One Day or of One Week, but for Months together. In the Bay of Aboukir, on the New Inundation, and on the Nile, for One Hundred and Sixty Effles, they have been employed without Intermifion, and have fubmitted to many Privations with a Chearfulnefs and Patience highly creditable to-them, and edvantageous to the public Service.

Sir Sidney Smith had originally the Command of the Seamen who landed from the Fleet; he continued on Shore till after the Capture of Rofetta, and returned on board the Figre a flort Time before the Appearance of Admiral Gantheaume's Squadron on the Coaft. He was prefent in the Three Actions of the Sth, 13th, and 21ft of March, when he dilplayed that Ardour of Mind for the Service of his Country, and that noble Intrepidity for which he has been ever fo confpicuous. Captain Stevenfon, of the Europa, fucceeded him, and I have every Reafon to be fatisfied with his Zeal and Conduct. The Crews of the Gun-Boats difplayed great Gallantry, under his Guidance, in the New Inundation; and much Approbation is alfo due to the Naval Officers who acted under his Orders.

Captain Prefsland of the Regulus has had the Direction for many Months paft of all Greek Ships in our Employment, and of those belonging to the Commission. He has been active, zealous, and indefatigable, and merits my warmelt Approbation. I must therefore beg Leave particularly to recommend this old and meritorious Officer to your Lordship's Protection.

Allow me to express an humble Hope, that the Army in Egypt have gratified the warmeft Wishes and Expectations of their Country. To them every Thing is due, and to me nothing. It was my Fate to fucceed a Man who created fuch a Spirit and eftablished fuch a Discipline amongst them, that little has been left for me to perform except to follow his Maxims, and to encleavour to imitate his Conduct.

This Difpatch will be delivered to your Lordfhip by Colonel Abercianaby, an Officer of confiderable Ability, and worthy of the great Name which he bears. He will one Day, I truft, emulate the Virtue and Talents of his never fufficiently to be lamented Father.

## TRANSLATION.

ARTICLES of the CAPITULATION proposed by Abdoullaby Jacques François Menou, General in Chief of the French Army now in Alexandria, to the Generals commanding the Land and Sea Forces of His Britannic Majefly, and of the Sublime Porte, forming the Blockade of Alexandria, dated the 12th Frudidor, Year Nine of the French Republic (30th August 1801).

Art. I. From the prefent Date to the 30th Euclidor, (17th September 1801,) there shall be a Continuation of the Truce and Suspension of Arms between the French Army and the Combined Armies of His Britannic Majesty and of the Subline Porte, upon the same Conditions with those which actually subfish, with the Exception of a
