To the CAPTORS present at the Surrender of the Cape of Good Hope on the 16th of September 1795.

THE King, by His Majesty's Sign Manual, having been graciously pleased to grant the Proceeds of the Property captured at the Cape of Good Hope to General Sir Alured Clarke, K. B. and Admiral Lord Keith, K. B. in Trust, to be by them paid and distributed to the individual Captors, according to the Proportions described upon the said Royal Grant, and the Receipt of the said Money being immediately expected;

Notice is therefore hereby given, that all Persons entitled to share in the Property captured, as above, upon or subsequent to the 15th September 1795, will be paid their respective Proportions at the following Places, and in the Order and Mode hereafter described:

Those entitled to share for the Army will be paid at No. 21, Milbank-Street, Westminster:

Those entitled for the Navy and the India Ships at No. 36, Broad-Street Buildings, London.

The said Payments will commence on Wednesday the 13th and Thursday the 14th Day of January 1802, to the Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of the Army, and to the Fourth and Fifth Classes of the Seamen, but only to the Parties themselves, as no Power of Attorney will be then paid for either of those Persons or Classes, nor until the Expiration of Three Months after the first Day of Payment, unless such Power be presented by a Wife or other near Relation.

The Payments to the General, Flag, and Field Officers, and to the Captains, Lieutenants, and Warrant Officers, will commence on Friday the 15th January 1802, to themselves or their Attornies legally authorised.

No Order or Power will be paid to for the Privates and Seamen of the Fourth and Fifth Classes which are not conformable to or correspondent with the Act relative to the Payment of Seamen's and Marines' Wages and Prize-Money, and all Agents are requested to send a Week previous to the Times of Payment, Lists of those for whom they intend to claim, mentioning the Act
