Notice is hereby given, that His Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on Wednesday the 10th Instant.

Whitehall, January 30, 1802.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Sunday Night the 13th Instant, Four Men, with Guns and Dogs, were found killing the Rabbits in a Warren belonging to Mr. Thomas Crewe Dod, of Edge Whitechurch, in the County of Chester, One of which was seized by the Servants of Mr. Dod; and in bringing the said Person to the House Three other Men came up with violent Threats and Imprecations, and presenting their Guns to the Servants' Breasts, swore they would kill them on the Spot if they did not instantly release the Man, and they struck one of the Servants violently on the Breast, which compelled them to let go the Man they had secured; upon this they were pursued by the others, and fired at by one of the Party, by which Two of Mr. Dod's Servants were wounded;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Felony, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person who actually fired such Gun,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of THIRTY POUNDS is hereby offered, by the Magistrates; and TWENTY POUNDS by Mr. Thomas Crewe Dod, to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as is before excepted,) to be paid on the Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.

Whitehall, February 2, 1802.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that, early in the Morning of the 28th of December last, as James Skidmore and Edward Cox Tooby, Officers of Excise, at Norwich, assisted by Two private Soldiers belonging to the 3d Regiment of Dragoon Guards, were conveying to that City Six Horses and Five Carts, with a large Quantity of smuggled Geneva and Tobacco, which they had seized from Henry Smith, on Cayston-Heath, Norfolk, they were violently assaulted, soon after passing through the Village of Orsford, by upwards of Thirty Men unknown, armed with Blunderbusses, Guns, Pistols, and other offensive Weapons, who immediately fired upon them, beat and much bruised one of the Officers, wounded a Soldier, and rescued Two Horses and Carts, and Part of the Geneva.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the daring Outrage above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Accomplice or other Person who shall discover, his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
