The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's VV Order in Council of the Second Day of December last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coasswife, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inslicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Ma-"jetty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, " and to enforce the Law for empowering His Ma-" jesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, 44 or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwife of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Second Day of December last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Tenth Day of this instant February, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained of His Majesty or His Privy Council: But it is; nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the faid Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernfey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His
