Orders for the Court's going into Mourning on Sunday next, the 25th Instant, for the late Queen of Sardinia, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-Rings, Black or White Shoes, Fans, and Tippetts.

Undress, White or Grey Lutestrings, Tabbies, Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black full-trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles. Undress, Grey Froaks.

The Court to change Mourning on Sunday the 2d of May next, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans, and Tippetts; or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or plain White, or White and Gold or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 6th of May the Court to go out of Mourning.

*Whitehall, April 19, 1802.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto Captain Thomas Louis, of the Royal Navy, his Royal Licence and Permission to accept the Rank of Commander of the Order of St. Ferdinand and of Merit, which it is the Intention of Ferdinand the Fourth, King of the Two Sicilies, to confer upon him; and to bear the Insignia of Commander of the said Order:

And also to command, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration, together with the relative Documents, be registered in His College of Arms.

*Whitehall, April 24, 1802.*

The King has been graciously pleased to grant unto Richard Newman Toll, of Thornbury Park, in the County of Gloucester, and of Hamilton, in North Britain, Doctor of Physick, Third but Se-

cond surviving Son of Ashburnham Toll, late of Northampton, Attorney at Law, and Grandson of Ashburnham Toll, sometime of Graywell, in the County of Southampton, Esq; by Anne his Wife, Sister of Sir Richard Newman, Bart. deceased, His Royal Licence and Authority that he and his Issue may take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Newman only, in compliance with the Limitations contained in the Will of his Relation Frances Newman, late of Old Palace-Yard, Westminster, in the County of Middlesex, Spilster, deceased, who was daughter of the said Sir Richard Newman, and Sister and Heir of Sir Samwell Newman, Baronets; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office:

And also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

*Whitehall, April 24, 1802.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto Edmund Henn, of Whiteleigh-House, in the County of Devon, Esq; His Royal Licence and Authority that he and his Issue may assume and take the Surname of Gennys, and bear the Arms of Gennys and Henn quarterly, (he having intermarried with Mary, only Daughter and sole Heir of John Gennys, late of Whiteleigh-House aforesaid, Esq; deceased,) provided that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in the College of Arms, otherwise to be void, and of none Effect.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honorable Francis Lord Napier to be His Majesty's High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

And Your flesh and Bones Burnt and your aishes Blown away with the weerd I send this as a frind; and Pleaie to let your Master Know that there is Sum thing concerning him. But at present I cannot let you know: But I Beleve it will be Greate Sevaritys for they will Componhim as a theste in the night Pleaie to take this as from a frind I Be Chance Saw it in a letter
