THIS Day the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common-Council of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty (being introduced by the Lord in Waiting), with the following Address, which was read by Sir John William Rose the Recorder:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne with the most lively Sentiments of Allegiance, Gratitude, and Affection, to congratulate your Majesty on the Return of Peace to the United Kingdom, over which Providence has placed your Majesty, not more conspicuously to govern than to bless.

When we contemplate the Nature of the War in which your Majesty has been engaged, the unexampled Difficulties which have attended its Progress, and, above all, the great Object of Preservation which it had in View, namely, the inviolate Purity of that venerable Structure, our glorious Constitution, at once the Palladium of our Liberties, and the Sanctuary of our Altars, what must necessarily be our triumphant Feelings, as Britons, at the Close of this arduous Contest, which inscribes in the Archives of Europe your Majesty's Navy more proudly pre-eminent than at the Termination of any former War, which to the Name of the British Soldier, gives a Lustre equal to the Glory of ancient Time, and which records the determined Efforts of your Majesty's People united in Arms.
