Compais, about a Quarter of a Mile from the Northernmost Bay of Bornholm. In confequence of the Height of this Mountain, this Light-House will be 272 Feet above the Level of the Water. Hour after Suniet till Sunrife, and in Winter, that is, from Michaelmas-Day to Easter-Day, from Half an Hour after Sunfet till Sunrife.
