during the Space of Six Months from the Date hereof; and whereas the faid last-mentioned Order in Council will now shortly expire, and whereas it is expedient further to continue the same with such Alteration and Exception, as is hereinafter mentioned, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and purfuant to the Powers so vested in His Majesty, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export Corn, or any of the Articles as aforesaid, and the said Permission to import and take out of Warehouse, foreign Corn, and other Articles as aforesaid, and likewise to import certain other Articles of Provision, excepting only the Article of Rice, as expressed in the said Order, bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, with every Exception, Proviso, Rule, Regulation, and Restriction specified in the said Order respecting such Exportation, Importation, or taking out of Warehouse; and all Matters and Things in the said Orders contained, shall be and continue in force until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three; and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
