Whitehall, June 26, 1802 Hereas it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majefly's Cuftoms, that, on Sunday the 6th Day of June instant, as William Woodard and Five other Boatmen, in the Service of the Customs, belonging to the Six-Oared Boat under the Commund of Mr. Simon Baspall, Sitter, were out upon Duty on the Cliff at Southwold, about Three o'Clock in the Morning, they discovered a Lug-Sail Vessel and a Lug-Sail Boat (marked on the Stern Fly of Rye) within her, Sailing to the Northward, close to the Shore, and pur-fuing the same along the Shore as far as Easton Cliff, they were there met by Nine stout Sailors, one of whom appeared to be the Master, all armed with Muskets and Cutlasses; that the Officers sav them load their Muskets as they approached, and, upon their coming up, they told the faid Officers that they had Goods and did not mean to lose them, and desired the said Officers to turn back as far as the Hedge, otherwise they would fire upon them; that the faid Officers were thereupon obliged to retreat, and, after being detained and guarded by the faid Sailors for a confiderable Time, they were then compelled to go to a Public House at South Cove, where they were likewise confined and guarded by the said armed Sailors until Seven o'Clock in the Evening, during which Time the Whole of the Goods were, as it is supposed, carted off from the Shore and carried up the Country;

" Ouce more I make bold to write to you on the " occation wich hope you found no deceat from my " last-wich in a shorte time will be compleatley finished but now it is your old Frend Alason's turn " to fuffer a littel, as well has you all and then youre's agen-no dout but you think your lofs very grate, but nothing in proportion from what " you will fufer-no dout but it was very much alarmeing to all Spectators but the next will be " more dreadful and aftonishing to your beholders-" for my part i dont much admire doing fuch business as that where no profit attends it-i think " I shall take another Plan upon Alasons as i understand he his not wanting of Money - but if you -will fulfill my defire I will rest where i am " tho' I must have one turn upon Alason-After "your property destroying will be your persons depend upon it"

I am yours" " your Frend that destroys your property will think no more of takeing your life"
