less the 23 of the last Month; in which he gives [them an account, That the Elector of Brandenburg had resolved to establish a Trade on the Coasts of Guinea and Angola, and to that purpose had caused two friggts to be fitted out, and intended to put a good number of Soldiers on Board of them: That the intention of his Electoral Highness was not to give the Company any diffurbance in their Trade, and that to prevent all misunderstandings he had thought fit to give them this Notice, adding, that if they judged it for their Service, the Brandenburg Frigats should have Orders to take all Dutch Ships failing without their Commission, and that a like Liberty should be given the Company with regard to the Brandenburgs. Whereupon the Directors of the faid Company have Addressed themselves to the States of Holland, to know their Sentiments in the thing. We told you in our last that it was reported, That several Frigats would be built here for the Service of Spain, which does not only continue, but is now spoken of with more conhdence, as a thing that will be fuddenly taken in hand. Our Conful at Cadiz has complained to the States, That the Governor of that place had caused some of his Goods to be seized, and afterwards to be fold, to raise 100 Ducates, which the Governor had condemned him, upon a difference between him and som other person, to pay; upon which the States have resolved to demand of the Court of Spain, That the faid Goods may be reflored to the Conful, or other fatisfaction given him. From Bruffels we understand, that the Burg ers have of late been very diforderly, and that there was a talk as if the new Governor would keep his Court at Ghent.

Hague, Sept. 28. We are expecting to hear that the Spanish Man of War, taken the 18th Instant in Oftend Road, is brought to Gluckstadt, or foir e other Port on the Elbe, for we cannot believe they will pass the Sounds with it to carry it to Conningsberg, or the Pillaw. The Commander of the Brandenburg Frigats let the Governor of Oftend know, by the Maffer and Seamen he fet ashoar, That pursuant to the Orders he had from his Electoral Highness, he had taken the faid Ship by way of Reprizal for the Subfidies the Crown of Spain remains owing to him; That he would lend her to Conningsberg; That his Electoral Highness would expect three Months. for the Spaniards to give him fatisfaction in concerning the faid Arrears, which if they did not in that time, he would canfe the faid Ship and goods to be fold. In the mean time people here continue to be much concerned that things have so falled out at a time when it is so necessary to be united

for preserving the Publick Peace.

Hague, Oit. 1. From Paris we have advice that the Dutch Ambassador had acquainted the French King. That the Spanish Commissioners had received new Powers without the Tirle of Burgundy, and that the States General were now in hopes (seeing that obstacle was removed) that the Assembly at Courtray would foon determine the difference about the Limits; at which Hismost Christian Majessy seemed well pleased, assuring the said Ambassador that he would endeavour to preserve the Peace. Pursuant to the Memorials of the Spanish Envoy, about the seizling the Spanish Man of War at Osend, the States have writ very pressingly in that affait to the Elector of Brandenburg, and have

at the same time ordered the respective Admiralties to send out forthwith what Ships they have in readines, to prevent the 1 ke misches for the survey. The Prince of Orange has been received at Zell and at Hanouer with the greatest marks of respect imaginable.

Paris, Sept. 26. We have advice that our Galleys are returned to Marseilles. The King of Spain having granted a new Power to his Commissioners at Courses (in which the Title of Burgundy is left out) the Conferences there will be renewed. The Dauphin is not well.

Chester, Sept. 20. On Saturday last the young Earl of Offery set Sail from Neslon in this River, in the Portsmouth Yacht, for Dublin

Portsmouth, Sept. 21. The 19th in the Evening the Pearle Frigat Sailed from Spithead to the Westward.

Plymouth, Sept. 21. This Morning His Majesties Ship the Phænix, Captain Blake Commander, went out to Cruite to the Westward, having on board him a Spanish Knight, who has been some days here, expecting the Arrival of the Prince of Parma.
