The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Derby.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majefty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Derby, affembled at a public Meeting of the faid County, beg Leave, to approach your Throne with lively Sentiments of Affection, to congratulate your Majefty on the happy Reftoration of Peace.

With great Admiration and Gratitude, and with a just National Pride, we have witneffed during the late arduous and eventful Contest, the unexampled Heroifm and Valour difplayed in your Majefty's Fleets and Armies, and the fleady and genuine For-titude and Patriotifm manifelted by all Ranks of your Majesty's loyal Subjects, whereby, under the Auspices of Divine Providence, the Honor and Independence of the Kingdom have been maintained; its Religion, Laws, and Liberties preferved ; the baneful Principles of Anarchy fuccefsfully refifted, and your Majefty's faithful Subjects reftored to the Bleffings of Peace.
