Now be it known, That the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland: and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.
