Now be it known, That the faid [Perfon's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the faid Ship [Ship's Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the faid United States, and no other Article whatfoever, and to carry the faid Bread, Flour, Ingian Corn, and Live Stock, to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland: and on the Arrival of the faid Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Perfor having the Charge or Command of the faid Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, -and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the faid Collector or other proper Officer of the Cultoms.

This Licence to continue in Force for Calendar Months from the Date hereof.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-feventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to provide for the more speedy Payment of all Navy, Victualling, and Transport Bills that shall be issued in future.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to enquire and examine into any Irregularities, Frands, or Abuses which are or have been practised by Persons employed in the several Naval Departments thereinmentioned, and in the Business of Prize Agency; and to report such Observations as shall occur to them for preventing such Irregularities. Frauds, and Abuses; and for the better conducting and managing the Business of the said Departments, and of Prize Agency, in suture.

An Act to amend so much of an Act made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majelty, intituled An Act for amending the Laws relating to the Militia in England, and for augmenting the Militia; as relates to the Exemption of Licensed Teachers of any separate Congregation from serving in the Militia.

An Act to rectify a Mistake in an Act, made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, intituled An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay of the Militia of Ireland, until the Twenty-lifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, and for holding Courts Martial on Serjeant-Majors, Serjeants, Corporals, and Drummers for Offences committed during the Time such Militia shall not be embodied; relative to the Pay of Serjeants, Corporals, and Drummers.

An Act for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for reguating, until the Fisteenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and for permitting, from and after the passing thereof, until the said First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, and the Importation of Mat into Great Britain from Ireland.

An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, see much of an Act, made in the Forty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and for permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions, without Payment of Duty.

An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta.
