The Lord Chancellor has appointed William Thompson, of Sheffield, in the County of York, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

Whitehall, January 8, 1803

WHERCAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that about Seven o'Clock of the Evening of the 11th Ultimo, Daniel Barlett, Supervisor of Excise, at Dartmouth, in the County of Devon, in the Execution of his Duty, was met by certain Persons unknown, driving Two Horses laden with Smuggled Goods, at or near a Place called Palmer's-Cross, in the Parish of Modbury, in the said County; and that one of them dressed in a White Dress, called a Smock-Frock, with a long Bludgeon or Pole knocked him off his Horse, and cruelly beat and wounded him, of which Wounds he is since dead;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Murder above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Accomplice, (except the Person who actually gave the Blows, by which the Deceased was killed,) who shall discover any of the Persons concerned therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS is hereby offered to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as is before excepted,) to be paid on Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders, by the Commissioners of Excise.

HIS Majesty having been graciously pleased to direct, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 22d Day of October 1802, that the following Bounties be granted to Sixty Chaplains in His Majesty's Navy, who have served during the late War with France, Spain, and Holland, and do not enjoy the Benefit of any Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment from the Crown, or otherwise, of the Annual Value of Seventy Pounds, viz.

To the Twenty who shall have served longest actually at Sea, not under Seven Years, a Bounty of Four Shillings per Day:

To the next Twenty who shall have served longest actually at Sea, not under Five Years, Three Shillings per Day:

And to the next Twenty who shall have served longest actually at Sea, not under Four Years, Two Shillings and Sixpence per Day:

And further ordered that, in Case any of the Chaplains now receiving His Majesty's Bounty, granted by former Orders in Council, should have served at Sea during the late War, their Time of Service in either of the preceding Wars shall be included, and be considered as entitling them to the Benefit of that Class to whom a Bounty is granted by His Majesty's present Order, exceeding the Amount of that they may at present enjoy.

Notice is hereby given to such Chaplains as may be entitled to claim His Majesty's Bounty as aforesaid, that they must deliver into this Office, on or before the 31st Day of March next, a List of the Ships they have served in, together with an Affidavit made before a proper Magistrate, that they have not enjoyed the Benefit of any Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment from the Crown, or otherwise, of the Annual Value of Seventy Pounds, between the 22d October and the 31st December 1802.
