Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that an Inflammatory Threatening Paper, has been stuck up against the Wall of the Front of the Public-House, called the New Inn, at Freshford, in the County of Wilts, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

To the Shearmen

It is the wish of the community that all Shearmen will endeavor to procure all implements of Defence & ammunition as it is requested if government gives the business unfavorable to the Shearmen it is the Determination of the Shearmen to do the business by force of Arms & bid defiance to the military force, and destroy all Clothiers that encourage such Machinery likewise their family as there will be a provision made for every man that shall kill or destroy any Clothier or factory or dwelling house after it is settled by government—clothier that encourage such machinery. and it is hoped that every man—regardless of Death, as it is if we die, it is in a bed of honour for us men—die before his appointed time, therefore rise with your whole wait and be revenged—will ever suffer your bread & childrens to be taken from you by such oppressors upon them and cut them up like chaff, for they have oppressed us long enough, requested that all men having arms and ammunition will send in their names—10th day of Feby. 1803—& mutually agree to be commanded by officers—appointed by the majority of 13 of the oldest Soldiers or engineers. God save all found members.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and fixing up the said Paper, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Person who actually wrote the same,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

American Claim-Office, London, Jan. 24, 1803.

By the Board of Commissioners appointed under the Seventh Article of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce, and Navigation, concluded at London on the 4th Day of November 1794, between His Britannic Majesty and the United States of America.

Whereas by the Third Article of a Convention, concluded at London on the 8th of January 1802, relative to the Sixth and Seventh Articles of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce, and Navigation, between the Plenipotentiaries of His Britannic Majesty and the United States of America, it is, amongst other Things, agreed and concluded, "That all Sums of Money awarded to be paid to British or American Claimants, according to the Provisions of the said Seventh Article, shall be made payable in Three equal Instalments, the first whereof to be paid at the Expiration of One Year, the Second at the Expiration of Two Years, and the Third and Last at the Expiration of Three Years, next
