To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars, of the University of Cambridge. Most Gracious Sovercign,

WE, your Majeîty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Mafters, and Scholars of your Univerfity of Cambridge, humbly beg Leave to offer to your Majeîty our warmeft Congratulations upon the Detection and Defeat of the late atrocious, defperate, and determined Confpiracy againft your Majeîty's Royal Perfon. It is, however, with the deepeft Concern, and with the utmost Deteftation we reflect, that these wicked Machinations, originating in the baseft Principles, were directed to the Subversion of every Thing, which ought to have been held most valuable and dear to all Subjects, faithful to the true Interests of their Country, to their Constitution, and their King.

After a Life uniformly devoted to our general Welfare and Happinels, it might have been expected that no Man would have proved himfelf fo hardened, fo daring in traitorous Projects, as to aim at the Destruction of the august and beloved Father of his People, most justly endeared to us by every facred Tie. But fince, from fome late Inflances, it is unhappily too evident, that, under the moft artful Difguife, the worft Intentions have been concealed, every Individual must readily concur in his tleady and carnelt Eudeavours to avert fuch alarm-ing Dangers; and, while he confults for the Secu rity of his Sovereign, to promote the fureft Means for his own Safety and the universal Good. Actuated by thefe Motives, among the most faithful of your Subjects, shall we of this Body, to whose Care is intrufted the important Charge, never cease to in-culcate into the Minds of our Youth every found Maxim of Loyalty and Obedicuce. And, as we have ever hitherto been guided by these Principles, fo we may farther hope to render a Service acceptable to your Majefly, by adhering in future to the fame Rate for our Conduct. Thus, we truft will our invariable Attachment to our King, our honest Zeal in the Support of the Constitution, united with the Maintenance of Religion and the Advancement of Literature and Science, be best proved by our Exertions in impreffing on all, true

Ideas of the ineftimable Advantages, which we now enjoy.

May that Providence, who most feasonably hath warded off a dark and deteftable Conspiracy, still guide the Minds of your prudent, vigilant, and active Counfellors to the timely Detection of such treasonable and horrid Defigus. May your Majesty long experience from all your Subjects, the most cordial Proofs of Affection, Fidelity, and Loyalty. And may they ever show themselves able and willing to support on every Occasion, their lawful Government, the Purity of their Religion, the Prosperity of their Country, and the Security of the best of Sovereigns.

To which Addrefs His Majefty was pleafed to return the following most gracious Anfwer :

Return you My Thanks for your affedionate Congratulations upon this fresh Instance of the Divine Protedion which has been vouchfafed to us; and I receive with the highest Satisfadion your Expression of the Horror and Detestation, which so wicked and unnatural a Defign to destroy our inseparable and common Interests, has so justly excited in your Minds.

You may rely on the Continuance of My Favour and Protection in Support of your uniform and laudable Exertions to promote in the rifing Generation the Principles of found Learning and true Religion.

To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefty.

Moft Gracious Sovereign,

W E, your Majesty's faithful and affectionate Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commonsand Citizens of your ancient and loyal City of Dublin, beg Leave to offer our fincere Congratulations to your Majesty upon your late figual Escape from the Devices of a Band of wicked Confpirators.

When we contemplate your Majefly's Royal Virtues, we must feel, in common with all your Majefly's loyal Subjects, the utmost Abhorrence at this recent and detellable Confpiracy: But whilst our Indignation is fo juftly excited against the Authors and Abettors of it, we cannot but admire this fresh Instance of the Interpolition of Divine Providence in protecting the best of Kings from the meditated Attack of the Traitor and Astaffin.

For the long Continuance of your Majefly's Life in Health and Happinefs, we, with all your faithful Subjects, do molt fervently pray; convinced that, in obtaining that Bleffing, we shall enjoy the best Security for all the Advantages of civil and religions Liberty enfured to us by our glorions Constitution.

In Teffimony whereof we have cauled the Common-Seal of faid City to be hereunto affixed, the Eighth Day of March, in the Forty-third Year of your Majefty's Reign.
